INTERIM TOWN MANAGER HIRED

Town Manager Maria Broadbent resigned, effective August 1, to accept another position in Massachusetts. The Town engaged a search firm to locate a new town manager. In the interim, Laura Allen, CPFO, ICMA-CM, has been appointed to manage Town affairs.

Ms. Allen served as the Town Administrator of Berlin, Maryland from 2013 through 2019. Before moving to the east coast in 2013, she was the City Manager of the Town of Colma, California for five years.

Ms. Allen has a Master's Degree in Public Administration along with over 30 years of public sector experience. She is a graduate of Leadership ICMA and the Senior Executive Institute (SEI) at the University of Virginia, Darden Graduate School of Business.

Ms. Allen currently serves on the Executive Board of the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) and as the Vice-President of the Maryland City/County Management Association (MCCMA).

Town Meeting Minutes June 10, 2020

This meeting was held by videoconference due to the ongoing COVID-19 health emergency, which prohibits large gatherings and advises Marylanders to remain socially distant. The meeting was broadcast on Berwyn Heights cable TV channels and streamed on the Town website. Residents were given the opportunity to comment by telephone and email.

The meeting was called to order at 7:03 p.m. Present were outgoing Mayor Stephen Isler, incoming Mayor Amanda Dewey, Mayor Pro Tempore (MPT) Jason Papanikolas, Councilmembers (CM) Jeffrey Jay Osmond, and Ethan Sweep, Mayor Pro Tempore-elect Jodie Kulpa-Eddy and Councilmember-elect Christopher Brittan-Powell. Also present were Town Manager (TM) Maria Broadbent, Treasurer Michelle Rodriguez, Town Clerk Kerstin Harper, Chief Kenneth Antolik, Lieutenant Daniel Unger, Detective Scott Krouse, Police Clerk Mercy Muralles, Code Director Hollyce Goodwin, Public Works Clerk Rosalie Jones, and Co-Chairs of the Walkable, Bikeable Berwyn Heights Task Force (WBBH) Drew Carlisle and James Wilkinson.

1. Approval of the Agenda

Mayor Isler requested a motion to move consideration of a letter to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to New Business. CM Sweep so moved. CM Dewey seconded. The motion passed 5 to 0.

2. Ceremonial Items

CI-05 – Cpl. Krouse Life Saver Award: On behalf of Chief Antolik and the Berwyn Heights Police Department, Mayor Isler awarded Cpl. Scott Krouse the Life Saver's Award for bravery and selflessness in the line of duty by preventing a suicide on the Cherrywood Lane bridge over the Capital Beltway in February 2020. He also awarded an Exceptional Duty award to Cpl. Krouse on behalf of the Council. Cpl. Krouse thanked Chief Antolik and the Council for the recognition and his colleagues for assisting in the rescue, which he considers having been a team effort.

CI-06 – Employee of the Year Awards: On behalf of TM Broadbent, Mayor Isler awarded Employee of the Year awards to Police Clerk Mercy Muralles, Public Works Administrative Assistant Rosalie Jones and Clerk Kerstin Harper for going beyond their normal duties to carry on the operations of their departments under the state of emergency declared due to the Coronavirus outbreak.

CI-07 – Citizens of the Year Awards: On behalf of the Council, CM Dewey presented Citizen of the Year awards to Drew Carlisle and James Wilkinson for chairing the Walkable, Bikeable Berwyn Heights Task Force. WBBH worked hard to draft a comprehensive report outlining a vision and actionable recommendations for making Berwyn Heights safer for pedestrians and bicyclists. Mr. Carlisle and Mr. Wilkinson thanked the Council for the award and said that they plan to stay involved.

CI-08 – Pride Month Proclamation: Mayor Isler read a Proclamation expressing the Council's support for the LGBTQ community of Berwyn Heights. CM Dewey moved to proclaim June 2020 Pride Month in the Town of Berwyn Heights. CM Sweep seconded. The motion passed 5 to 0.

3. Approval of Minutes

CM Sweep moved to approve the May 13 Town meeting minutes. MPT Papanikolas seconded. The motion passed 5 to 0.

4. Unfinished Business

There was none.

5. New Business

Resolution 07-2020 – Amending Comprehensive Fee & Fine Schedule: TM Broadbent said it is proposed that the Comprehensive Fee and Fine Schedule be amended to raise the notary fee from \$1 to \$2 per page to more accurately reflect the cost of the service. CM Osmond moved and MPT Papanikolas seconded to approve the amended Fee & Fine Schedule. The motion passed 5 to 0.

Resolution 08-2020 – CARES Act Funding Request: TM Broadbent explained that Prince George's County was authorized to disburse Coronavirus relief funds released by the U.S. Treasury Department. Berwyn Heights applied to be reimbursed for \$193,836 in expenses related to the emergency, including personal protective equipment, hazard pay, vote-by-mail election, support for enabling employees to telework, small businesses relief funding, and disinfecting Town facilities. Council action to approve the funding request is required as part of the application.

Code Compliance Director Goodwin gave an overview of her Department's outreach efforts to the Berwyn Heights business community, one of the funding requirements under the CARES Act. Businesses were asked whether they are open or closed, had layoffs, and/or made changes to operations. Some 40 businesses said they have remained open throughout the emergency, another 20 had recently reopened and 5 remain closed. Most businesses

nesses reported changes in procedures to implement social distancing, PPE and disinfecting measures, and some had reductions in staff.

Cpl. Krouse said he worked with the Code Department to follow up on the outreach efforts. Businesses were very appreciative of the Town making contact and most are ready to go back to work full time.

CM Osmond made a motion to approve the Resolution. CM Sweep seconded. The Council thanked TM Broadbent for being proactive in identifying opportunities for Berwyn Heights at the State and County level. The motion passed 5 to 0

TM Broadbent gave an update on the Coronavirus State of Emergency. Berwyn Heights declared a State of Emergency on March 13, which was amended on March 23 to make its end coincide with that of the State of Maryland. Prince George's County has recently experienced a steep increase in COVID-19 cases, probably precluding an opening of Town facilities prior to Labor Day. The Council may want to add worksessions to its meeting schedule, but meetings would likely continue to be held via video conference.

Resolution 09-2020 – Approval of Contract for Professional Janitorial Services: TM Broadbent explained that a request for bids was put out for providing janitorial services at all Town buildings. Three bids were received. One was very expensive, another was withdrawn, and the third was from the current contractor. She recommends extending the contract with the current vendor, Ash Maids, for another year. CM Dewey moved, and CM Sweep seconded to approve the contract. The motion passed 5 to 0.

Letter re: FCC Declaratory Ruling regarding Small Cell Facilities: TM Broadbent explained that the Council in 2019 adopted Ordinance 125 to authorize the Town to review applications and issue permits to companies seeking to install small cell facilities in the Town right-of-way. The Council has submitted a letter objecting to a proposed rule by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) that would further limit the power of municipalities to review and impose standards on the deployment of 5G infrastructure. The letter of opposition has been placed on the agenda for the record.

6. Department Reports

CM Dewey moved to receive all department reports for the record. CM Sweep seconded. The motion passed 5 to 0.

Administration: MPT Papanikolas reported that the Town held a successful vote-by-mail election and thanked the Board of Election Supervisors and Clerk Harper for the fast implementation of a new election process. He also commended TM Broadbent and Treasurer Rodriguez for working closely together to keep the Administration Department running.

Mayor Isler said he was present during the counting of ballots and confirmed that the Election judges completed the canvassing and counting of the 673 ballots in approximately six hours.

TM Broadbent commended Treasurer Rodriguez for being elected President of her professional organization, the International Public Management Association for Human Resources.

Code Compliance: CM Osmond said he is proud to report that, under his tenure, the Code Compliance Department became fully staffed and implemented a system of tracking data that will allow it to spot long-term trends and stay ahead of the curve. He hopes to leave this as a legacy for the next Council.

Public Safety: Mayor Isler commended BHPD for doing a great job in protecting the Town. They are forward looking, innovative and friendly to anyone visiting their station.

Public Works: CM Sweep thanked the Public Works crew for continuing to pick up trash and recycling despite the ongoing pandemic. Residents appreciate it greatly. He reported that more litter is present on Town streets since the monthly Town cleanups have been suspended. He asked residents to refrain from littering and possibly help pick it up on their own.

Parks, Recreation, Education & Civic Affairs: CM Dewey thanked the Board of Election Supervisors and Clerk Harper for their fast turnaround in implementing a vote-by-mail election and the voters for voting in great numbers. She also reminded everyone to continue to adhere to all safety procedures to minimize the spread of the Coronavirus while businesses and public facilities are reopening.

CM Dewey reported on the activities of Town organizations. The Green Team has suspended its Town cleanups for the duration of the pandemic but will lend its tools to anyone who wishes to pick up litter individually. It is also working on completing the Town's Sustainable Maryland recertification, and is holding another 'Trees of Distinction' contest. The Education Advisory Committee is working with the PTA to keep the Berwyn Heights Elementary school in its position on the PGCPS' facilities improvement plan.

The Recreation Council is arranging a series of virtual concerts throughout the summer and BHPD is planning a virtual celebration of 'National Night In' on August 4.

7. Councilmember Statement re George Floyd Protests & Discussion

CM Dewey moved to receive Councilmembers' statements on the George Floyd protests. CM Sweep seconded . The motion passed 5 to 0.

Mayor Isler said the Council received an email asking the Council to issue a statement regarding the killing of George Floyd, an unarmed African American man, by a white police officer on May 25, 2020 and the ensuing protests. Councilmembers each drafted individual statements that were published on the Town website and social media. Councilmembers also wanted to read their statements into the public record tonight.

Mayor Isler, MPT Papanikolas, CM Sweep, and CM Dewey read their statements condemning the killing of George Floyd, the behavior of the officers who detained Mr. Floyd, and the continued existence of racism in policing and in American society, generally. CM Osmond made a brief remark regarding prejudice and racism.

Chief Antolik condemned the killing of George Floyd and explained BHPD's approach to policing. He said that BHPD's policies on the use of force already comply with recommendations put forward by the International Association of Chiefs of Police in response to the George Floyd incident and that he holds his officers to the highest standards in their interactions with the public. He welcomed Councilmembers to ride along with officers on patrol and to review BHPD policies and practices.

There ensued discussion about available training opportunities for BHPD officers, the proposed removal of school resource officers from Prince George's County schools, policing in the context of the racial makeup of Prince George's County, methods of engaging youth and the community generally, and building a respectful relationship with LGBTQ individuals.

8. Announcement of Election Results

Clerk Harper announced the results of the June 9 Town Council election. Out of 2073 active registered voters in Berwyn Heights 675 voted, approximately double the number of recent elections. Amanda Dewey was elected Mayor with 500 votes (74% of those who voted); Jodie Kulpa-Eddy was elected Mayor Pro Tem with 461 votes (68%); Jason Papanikolas received 383 votes (57%); Chris Brittan Powell 326 votes (48%); and Ethan Sweep 311 votes (46%).

9. Outgoing Mayor's Remarks

Mayor Isler thanked residents for their support of him as a first-time Councilmember and Mayor throughout a difficult term. He decided not to run for another term because he cannot give the job his full attention at this time and does not want to do a disservice to the Town. He thanked the Council, TM Broadbent and Chief Antolik for working together to produce a large package of legislative accomplishments.

Incoming Mayor Dewey asked if CM Osmond had some final remarks. CM Osmond said he stepped up when there was a need to fill a vacancy. It was a pleasure to help and serve. He would do it again if given the opportunity.

10. Swearing-in of Council

Mayor Dewey said she was sworn in the afternoon by the Clerk of the Circuit Court in Upper Marlboro and will now swear in the remaining Councilmembers. The paperwork will be signed after the meeting in Councilmember's driveways. She swore in MPT Kulpa-Eddy first and then CMs Papanikolas, Sweep and Brittan Powell.

11. Incoming Mayor's Remarks

Mayor Dewey thanked everyone for their support. She said it will be an honor to serve the Town about which she cares so much. It is also a responsibility, which will require leadership during an ongoing pandemic and a national conversation about racial inequality. She believes the Town will get through it together if everyone is open and brave about facing the challenges.

Mayor Dewey announced the departmental assignments of the incoming Council. MPT Kulpa-Eddy will lead Parks, Recreation, Education & Civic Affairs (PRECA), CM Papanikolas the Administration Department, CM Sweep the Public Works Department and CM Brittan-Powell the Code Compliance Department.

Mayor Dewey said she is looking forward

to working with the new Council. Her priorities include better communication with residents, tending to local partnerships with neighboring cities, Prince George's County and the State of Maryland, conservation and sustainability, education, and improving walkability and bikeability of the Town.

12. Remarks of the Incoming Council

MPT Kulpa-Eddy thanked the voters for reelecting her. Having been on the Council before, she hopes to bring her experience and historical perspective to discussions on challenges and opportunities the Council might face during this term.

CM Papanikolas said he looks forward to working with this well qualified Council and pledged to always listen and respect their opinions even if he is not in agreement. He thanked the voters for voting in a new way in record numbers, as well his family and friends for helping with his campaign.

CM Brittan Powell said he loves Berwyn Heights where he raised his children and where he will spend the rest of his life. He thinks this will be a good Council and looks forward to working with everyone to get the Town through what he believes will be an economically tough time.

CM Sweep thanked the voters for reelecting him. He was a novice during the previous term and pledges to continue to learn from other leaders to become a better Councilmember. He is excited to continue the work begun during the last term to make the Town better and to make Berwyn Heights voices heard at the county and state levels.

Mayor Dewey concluded saying she believes there is no limit to what the Council can achieve working in partnership with the Town's great staff.

13. Citizen Discussion

Mike Attick, 62nd Avenue, called to congratulate Councilmembers on their election.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:32 p.m.

Worksession Minutes June 15, 2020

This meeting was held by videoconference due to the ongoing COVID-19 health emergency, which prohibits large gatherings and advises Marylanders to remain socially distant. The meeting was broadcast on Berwyn Heights cable TV channels and streamed on the Town website. Residents were given the opportunity to comment by

telephone and email.

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 p.m. Present were Mayor Dewey, Mayor Pro Tempore (MPT) Kulpa-Eddy, Councilmembers (CMs) Christopher Brittan-Powell, Jason Papanikolas, and Ethan Sweep. Also present were Chief of Police Kenneth Antolik, Lieutenant Daniel Unger, and Town Clerk Kerstin Harper.

1. Announcements

Mayor Dewey announced that Prince George's County has started phase two of reopening following the COVID-19 related closures; that the Recreation Council is hosting a virtual live-streamed concert on June 18 and that the BHPD has concluded its food drive.

2. Discussion Items

Policing policies review and discussion: Mayor Dewey welcomed Chief Antolik and Lieutenant Unger for what will be an ongoing discussion about BHPD policing policies and practices following the protests over the killing of George Floyd. The discussion will seek to 1. answer questions, including those received from residents, 2. Inventory what BHPD is already doing in terms of good policing practices; 3. Identify practices that might be formalized as policies and 4. Consider new ideas and initiatives that might be adopted.

Chief Antolik gave an overview of BHPD's policing policies and practices with a focus on use of force and accountability. He said BHPD's policies, as outlined in its Administrative and Operational Manual (General Orders) posted on the Town website, parallel those in the process of being drafted at the national level. They provide for the following:

- Forbid chokeholds:
- Mandate progression of force, beginning with verbal interactions and escalating to various levels of force only if necessary;
- Engage with the community;
- Demonstrate accountability by responding to calls for assistance around the clock, and answer citizen inquiries and complaints.

Q & A:

Chief Antolik and Lt. Unger responded to Councilmembers questions about policing:

Civilian bystanders who are witnessing a detainee experiencing a medical emergency while being arrested by police should tell a supervisor who may be on scene that he requires help, but not risk

their own safety by intervening. BHPD officers are bound to protect life and have a 'duty to intervene' if a detainee is at risk of serious injury or death.

BHPD has a rigorous hiring process to find officers that are a good fit for Berwyn Heights. It includes a state-mandated psychological screening, polygraph exam, drug screening and a physical fitness test, as well as an agility test and a written exam. As part of the background investigation, the BHPD detective interviews neighbors, co-workers, family and others and performs credit and social media checks to screen candidates. The entire process usually takes 6 to 8 months to complete.

The Maryland Training Commission is vested with the authority to certify law enforcement officers. All officers undergo regular in-service and firearms training to be recertified every two years. The Commission also maintains a list of decertified officers.

BHPD develops its policing policies by reviewing the policies of other agencies and adapting them for Berwyn Heights. One of the Chief's goals is to obtain accreditation for BHPD, but this is not possible with the station being in the current leased location. The building does not meet security requirements.

BHPD has an open-door policy for residents to voice concerns about policing issues. This includes Black residents and others who may experience anxiety about the current tensions between police and their communities. Officers who experience stress have access to counseling and they may be ordered to get counseling if they have been involved in a traumatic incident. Within Berwyn Heights' small police force supervisors are able to tell if an officer is not himself and requires help.

BHPD has been proactive in developing programs to engage different populations, from Latinos to seniors to youth, and is trying to find new ways to reach out during the pandemic.

BHPD officers do not respond to calls for service unarmed, even if the situation seems not to require an armed officer. Firearms are part of their uniforms. BHPD makes use of its officers who have counseling and social service backgrounds to de-escalate situations and encourage voluntary compliance with the law. However, not every incident can be de-escalated.

In the event BHPD receives a call from a person who may harm him or herself, officers are required to get them help. Depending on the seriousness of the situation, the person may be taken to a hospital to be evaluated.

Discussion:

Councilmembers sought to clarify which things BHPD does in practice that could be written down as policies to make policing standards transparent and applicable in the future. Chief Antolik and Lt. Unger responded as follows:

- When responding to a call, BHPD will seek to engage the persons involved.
 De-escalation of conflicts is the objective but is contingent on the situation. It may be a written policy.
- BHPD is required to use a force continuum as part of its written use of force policy. The policy is reviewed regularly in training and will be reevaluated when national standards are enacted.
- BHPD officers are required to intervene if an officer uses excessive force or abuses a suspect. It is a written policy in the General Orders posted on the website.
- With respect to the acquisition of equipment and vehicles, guidance was not provided to BHPD when the Council decided to return a controversial Humvee obtained in 2017 as an emergency vehicle through a military surplus program. However, BHPD did go up the chain of command to obtain approval from the Town Administrator and Mayor and does so for any other significant equipment purchases. A policy for acquiring novel equipment might be useful.
- Berwyn Heights is too small to require military type equipment for policing. In terms of uniforms, BHPD officers mostly wear traditional police uniforms when on duty and khakis and polos when engaging with the community. They do not have military style uniforms.
- BHPD officers are required to wear body cameras when on duty per written policy. When interacting with civilians they must announce that the camera is recording and turn it off if requested to do so. Cameras have a monitor in which people can see themselves being recorded. Upon return to the station, the footage is uploaded for storage and may be viewed by the public upon request, with exception of footage taken in private homes. Lt. Unger is responsible for the camera program and randomly reviews footage. Footage marked as evidence is kept for 2 years.

New ideas & initiatives:

Chief Antolik and Lt. Unger said they believe their relationship with Town residents is good and that they are ahead of the curve in community policing. Prior to the pandemic, BHPD engaged with the community on a regular basis. Right now, morale is low because of Covid-19 restrictions and the nationwide protests. Once things return to normal, BHPD and the Council might get together to come up with new outreach programs, while reviewing what works in other cities. BHPD would also like to have a new headquarters so that it can become an accredited agency.

In response to Council questions and suggestions, Chief Antolik said:

BHPD is willing to work with a citizens' accountability board that would review police conduct and use of force and make recommendations for improvements.

- BHPD is not currently a member of a police union. Larger police departments often have a union or a Fraternal Order of Police to collectively bargain with their employers.
- BHPD will look into hosting a virtual coffee with a cop.
- BHPD officers normally attend many workshops and seminars to train for the wide variety of service calls they respond to, from wellness checks to domestics to armed robberies. Training is made available to all officers and the clerk, not just the leadership. Some training is mandated by the State and often seeks to address current trends, such as dealing with autism or an increase in fraud. Currently, the training is mostly virtual, which is not as effective.

Mayor Dewey suggested it would be beneficial for the Town and its police officers to participate in a police program offered by the University of Maryland's Lab of Applied Social Science Research covering implicit bias, virtual reality and providing community resources. She will look into cost and dates and come back with specifics.

Citizen & Council Comments:

Shira Singer, Berwyn Road, asked via email whether BHPD would be interested in undertaking a racial justice campaign, possibly using yard signs or other publicity. Chief Antolik replied he is interested in anything residents suggest and recommended contacting him for setting up a conversation.

Councilmembers expressed their appreciation for Chief Antolik and Lt. Unger agreeing to have this difficult conversation

and working together to make the Town more welcoming. The conversation showed that BHPD already has many accountability measures in place, one of them being the posting of its policies online for all to see. BHPD's ride-along program was recommended as valuable for Councilmembers to understand what the police are experiencing on the beat.

There were none.

4. Department Reports

MPT Kulpa-Eddy announced a virtual concert on June 18. CM Brittan Powell reported he is setting up meetings with the Code Director and staff to learn in more detail how the department operates. CM Sweep reported that the Public Works Department is running smoothly and reminded everyone not to litter. Further, he noted the Supreme Court ruled that gender identity and sexual orientation are covered by the Civil Rights Act of 1964, thus outlawing discrimination in hiring LGBTQ people. CM Dewey said the Green Team is not holding Town cleanups during the pandemic but will lend its grabbers to anyone who wants to pick up litter individually. When visiting crowded Lake Artemesia park, everyone is requested to follow the one-way rule and other social distancing measures.

5. Town Council Schedule

The Council will attend a virtual conference of the Maryland Municipal League on June 29-30, hold a worksession on July 6 and Town meeting on July 8 via video conference.

6. Citizen Comments

There were none.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:50 p.m.





Recent Working Incidents

<u>June 24th</u>: Ladder Truck 14 and Ambulance 14 were alerted to the 8900Blk of 56th Ave in Berwyn Heights for reports of a house on fire. Company 14 arrived to find a small fire on the back deck, which was extinguished, and units checked for extension into the house.

June 27th: Rescue Squad 14B was dispatched as the Technical Rescue Support Unit for industrial farm accident in the Glenn Dale for a worker whose was leg trapped under a mini skidsteer. With the heavy rains that had came through the area in the days prior, conditions were more difficult to operate on due to the soft and wet soil. BHVFD operated for approximately 45 minutes and were able to extricate the patient.

<u>June 28th:</u> Ladder Truck 14 was alerted as the 3rd due Special Service to the 3400 block of Morlock Lane in Bowie for reports of smoke in the house. Units from Bowie VFD arrived to find a two story single family home with fire showing, and requested the working fire dispatch.

<u>July 8th</u>: Truck 14 was alerted to the 6300blk of Cheswold PI in Lanham for the reported house fire. BHVFD volunteers arrived to find a fire in the basement with hoarding conditions, and conducted searches, opened up the walls to expose the fire, and controlled utilities.

July 8th: Rescue Squad 14 was alerted to assist units in the 3200Blk of Powder Mill in Beltsville with an overturned vehicle with the driver trapped. Montgomery County Squad 715 (Burtonsville) was on scene but could not get the driver out. The volunteer crew from BHVFD took over the extrication, removed two doors and lifted the vehicles with rescue airbags to remove the drive.

<u>July 13th:</u> Truck 14 and its volunteer crew was alerted on the Working Fire Dispatch to assist units with a working apartment fire in the 11200Blk of Evans Trail in Beltsville. Upon arrival BHVFD split crews operating on the 1st and 2nd floors conducting searches, opening up, and controlling utilities.

July 13th: Rescue Squad was dispatched to NB Balt Wash Pkway at Laurel Bowie Rd for an accident with the driver trapped. The volunteer crew arrived an quickly extricate the drive who was transosrted to a trauma center with lifethreating injuries. While returning, the Squad was alerted to another accident on the Parkway NB at Greenbelt Rd. Co 14 arrived and extricated the trapped driver.





Hot cars can be deadly. Never leave children, pets, or older adults unattended in a parked car.

- Look Before You Lock. Get into the routine of always checking the back seat of your vehicle before you lock it and walk away.
- Keep a stuffed animal or other memento in your child's car seat, and move it to the front seat as a visual reminder when your child is in the car. Alternatively, place your phone, briefcase, or purse in the back seat when traveling with your child.
- A Routine Check. If someone else is driving your child, or you alter your daily routine, always check to make sure your child has arrived safely.


