Worksession Minutes December 6, 2021 | 7:00 pm

This meeting was held by videoconference due to the ongoing COVID-19 health emergency and was broadcast on Berwyn Heights cable TV channels and streamed on the Town website. Residents could comment by calling (301) 474-9570 or e-mailing Mayor Dewey at adewey@berwynheightsmd.gov.

Call to Order

Mayor Dewey called the meeting to order at 7PM. Present at the meeting were Mayor Amanda Dewey, Mayor Pro Tempore Jodie Kulpa-Eddy, Councilmember Christopher Brittan-Powell, Councilmember Jason Papanikolas, and Councilmember Ethan Staff present were Town Manager Laura Allen, Public Works Director Brad Pudner, and Town Clerk Melanie Friesen. Also present were students Marwa Mansour, Baylee Martin, and Jason Haslup from the University of Maryland for the CCC Student Presentation, Jennifer Hawkins from Prince George's County 311, Claudia Marin and Blackwell for Employ Prince Patricia George's Inc., Tony Ruffin and Barbara Gonzolez from Pepco, and Steve Beckham and Jim McGinnis for the Men's Basketball League.

Announcements

Mayor Dewey reported that the Prince George's County indoor mask mandate has been extended until at least late January. She also let everyone know that the Town Meeting on Wednesday, December 8, 2021 will be the first in-person meeting since the Covid-19 pandemic, and that there will be a 15 person capacity limit, including Council and staff. She added that overflow will be inthe Senior Center and masks will be required. Residents may still participate remotely, by calling in or sending emails as the meeting will be live streamed to the Town website and the television channels.

Approval of Agenda

MPT Kulpa-Eddy moved to approve the agenda. CM Papanikolas seconded. After no discussion, the motion passed unanimously.

Discussion Items

CCC Student Presentation

Director Pudner introduced the students and expressed gratitude for working with the students. The students of UMD spoke about the ArcGIS mapping of the public trees in the south section of Berwyn Heights, including preparing visualizations that could differentiate between tree type and condition, and creating a plan for future tree inventories of Berwyn Heights. The final report will include an online map with the sample data, visualizations of the findings, and the plan document for inventory maintenance. There were graphs and documentation of the different types of tree diversity, visualizations of the invasive species, and tree conditions and tree maintenance recommendations. MPT Kulpa-Eddy asked about the "other" category of tree species. This category was used when there were only one or two of that tree type in Town. The mapping of the trees will identify the individual trees and species. CM Papanikolas inquired about the technology used and if tree maintenance was done, could things be updated in real time. The students explained that if an ArcGIS license was purchased by the Town those things could be updated in real time. Director Pudner and the students discussed either the possibility of an intern to continue the program or an ongoing relationship with UMD to complete the inventory.

311 New System Orientation, Jennifer Hawkins

Jennifer Hawkins reviewed the new County 311 system, including the 311 On the Go system. She reviewed the mobile app and web portal as well as the current 311 call center. The launch will be happening soon. The County is in the final stages of testing the mobile app and the web portal. The service request types have been reduced from over 150 types to around 60. There are new features such as FAQs, the ability to find services, add photos, locations, and tracking service requests. The new system will be easier to use than ever before. MPT Kulpa-Eddy asked if the municipalities will be notified when a request is made that would not be in the jurisdiction of the County, but rather the Town. Ms. Hawkins explained that the person submitting the request would receive a notification that the request is outside the jurisdiction of the County and then direct the requestor to the correct agency in order to make that request.

EPG returning citizens program presentation

TM Allen introduced Patricia Blackwell and Claudia Marin from Employ Prince George's. Inc (EPG). She was excited to present the possible collaboration with Hyattsville and EPG to fill vacant positions in Public Works. EPG is a bridge between job seekers and businesses. Ms. Marin shared the types of Demographic Programs (and which populations are served by each), and the Industry Bridge Program options, which provide training for in-demand jobs. Ms. Blackwell shared the customized proposal for the Town. The goal is to hire returning citizens who reside in Berwyn Heights and the surrounding areas. Four participants would be recruited through information sessions that would result in 12 weeks of training and work experience with the Town. Participants are paid a stipend of \$12/hr by EPG during the training period; if hired, Berwyn Heights would be expected to continue to pay a minimum of \$12/hour. The proposed schedule would have the training ending in late July 2022. MPT Kulpa-Eddv asked about the participants and what parameters would be included in choosing candidates. Ms. Blackwell explained those requirements are up to the Town to determine. TM Allen reported that beyond the training the Town would follow their normal hiring process. Ms. Marin reiterated that the Town needs to be clear about what they want in candidates. CM Brittan-Powell asked for clarification and Ms. Blackwell stated that this is not a work release program. CM Papanikolas asked where in the release process that EPG begins working with candidates. Ms. Marin explained that they work with them throughout the release process.

Pepco charging stations, Tony Ruffin Pepco is working with municipalities to place public electric vehicle (EV) charging stations in the public right of way: present were Tony Ruffin and Barbara Gonzolez. TM Allen reviewed the parameters of the program, including that the chargers must be accessible to the public and not too close to the existing charging stations that the Town already has. A location near the police department in the public right of way was located. Users would purchase the electricity via an app. The Town Attorney has reviewed and suggested changes to the agreement that Pepco has agreed The charging stations are level 2 charging stations, but they are 7.7kw, making them a faster charging Level 2 CM Brittan-Powell raised the question of where the stations are being placed, expressing concerns about the location that was chosen. Ms. Gonzalez and Mr. Ruffin explained the details of the program stating the reasons why the current location was chosen, however Pepco is open to looking at additional locations. Mr. Ruffin also clarified that the chargers are part of Pepco's program and at no time is Pepco going to be asking the Town for maintenance. Ms. Gonzalez suggested that the Town contact the Maryland SHA to request signs to direct people to the new charging stations. MPT Kulpa-Eddy asked if it was required to reserve the parking spaces for EVs. She had concerns about the availability of parking for police vehicles which are not EVs. It was mentioned the Police Chief is supportive of this location, as BHPD will be getting EVs. MPT Kulpa-Eddy also had a question on the ability of the Town to cancel this agreement in the future (if necessary); TM Allen will work with Mr. Ruffin to clarify language in the License Agreement. CM Brittan-Powell expressed interest in having a Level 3 charger in the Town. Ms. Gonzalez stated that Level 3 chargers need to have a large amount of traffic to be qualified for Level 3 chargers (DC fast chargers), to justify that type of investment in infrastructure.

M-NCPPC Community Center Use Agreement Extension for Men's League Basketball

TM Allen presented a draft resolution that will give the Mayor the authorization to execute an extension agreement with Park and Planning in order to allow the League use of the BHCC basketball courts while negotiations continue on a new agreement. There was considerable discussion on the differences between the current use agreement and the proposed use agreement. Present from the Men's League were Steve Beckham and Jim McGinnis. Mr. Beckham informed that despite the name, women are eligible to play as well. MPT Kulpa-Eddy suggested

an edit in the resolution language to reflect that the Men's Basketball League is an official Berwyn Heights Town Organization and remove the language about it being a "parks and recreation league". The revised resolution will be on the December 8, 2021 Town Meeting agenda.

Outside meeting equipment/heaters

CM Brittan-Powell opened discussion on the feasibility of creating meeting areas outside during the COVID times, so that in-person events can occur outside. He expressed interest in purchasing propane heaters and tenting for the Town to use to facilitate outdoor events during colder months. Sweep asked if CM Brittan-Powell had any options and prices to present to Council to consider. CM Brittan-Powell stated that he has not researched thisyet, as he is seeking feedback before doing so. CM Papanikolas stated that he'd be willing to help research the costs. Mayor Dewey stated that she would not be in favor of purchasing heaters for Town Council meetings at this time because when she has engaged residents about the subject she has not heard favorable comment. CM Sweep remarked on the logistical issues in moving Council meetings outside, such as cameras, noise, and weather; it may be necessary to acquire electronics designed for outdoor use. Mayor Dewey expressed that Maryland Open Meetings Act requires reasonable access and adequate notice. The Councilmembers discussed their concerns regarding meeting notice and cost. MPT Kulpa-Eddy and CM Papanikolas expressed a desire to see cost estimates before getting into details of how a meeting area might be organized.

Election schedule

TM Allen presented the staff report, mentioning the two dates that have some flexibility and emphasizing the rest of the dates are set by Ordinance, either by a specific date or a specific time interval between events. MPT Kulpa-Eddy reported that she believed Council should not be involved in the decision-making regarding selection of the election judges, to avoid the appearance of any political pressure being placed on the judg-She believes the Election Ordinance asks the Town Clerk to select and present the slate of judges to the Council. CM Papanikolas agreed that there should be a layer of separation between election judges and Councilmembers that may be running for reelection. Staff will revise the election schedule to reflect that staff will present a slate to Council to review, rather than "interview" the applicants. CM Sweep pointed out an error in the dates in April which Staff will remedy and represent to Council at the Town Meeting. There was support for the "League of Women Voters" to moderate Candidate's night.

County Climate Action Plan Comment Letter

Mayor Dewey reviewed the Climate Action Plan letter. CM Sweep suggested a couple of edits to the language. MPT Kulpa-Eddy asked if there is data on how marginalized communities are disproportionally affected by the threats of climate change. Mayor Dewey and CM Sweep shared instances of how some populations are more affected than others.

Proposed ARPA spending process

The Mayor and Council spent considerable time discussing the next steps in the ARPA spending process. Mayor Dewey stated that Council has completed the public engagement process that the Council had outlined earlier in the year. This agenda item is presented to engage the next steps in the process. CM Brittan-Powell stated that he would like Council to determine their selection criteria. Council discussed using either a rubric to determine projects or rather using a more fluid approach. MPT Kulpa-Eddy asked about the final deadline to make a decision. Mayor Dewey and TM Allen explained that the timeline is selfimposed but is a function of it being incorporated in the FY23 budget. MPT Kulpa-Eddy stated that Council wasn't elected knowing that they'd have an additional 2.75 million dollars to spend, and that waiting to commit some of the funds could potentially wait until after the election. Mayor Dewey stated that there has been a public engagement process and every Council meeting is a public meeting open to community input. TM Allen also stated that the budget process is a public process and public engagement would continue then. CM Brittan-Powell suggested that the projects proposed may not be equitable in terms of access to residents who are generally underserved. He also suggested the idea of hiring an ARPA consultant. Mayor Dewey stated that from her perspective projects would always be viewed with an equity lens and that consultants would be chosen for specific projects based on their area of expertise. CM Papanikolas stated that he understood that many communities using consultants are using them on ways to manage the actual funds from an accountancy point of view rather than to how to use the funds.

Department Reports

Mayor Dewey reminded everyone that the indoor mask mandate has been extended until late January and encouraged everyone who is eligible to get a booster of the Covid vaccine. She reminded everyone that the Town Meeting will be in person, but with a 15 person capacity based on the room size with overflow space provided. She reviewed the Legislative Dinner. She noted that PGCMA is hosting a legislative "meet and greet" that she will be attending with CM Papanikolas. She thanked everyone involved in the tree lighting and craft fair. She reviewed the Holiday Town office closures. She flagged two upcoming Police Department events, including Cocoa with the PoPo and Santa's Mailbox. She also reminded people of the house watch form available on the Town Website.

MPT Kulpa-Eddy shared that she spoke at the Prince George's County Council meeting, providing public comment on the County redistricting map.Unfortunately, the County Council decided to carve up District 3. She attended the joint meeting of the Prince George's County and Montgomery County chapters of the

Maryland Municipal League, the District 3 Leaders Appreciation Reception, the Berwyn Heights Virtual Legislative Dinner, and the Prince George's County School Board Transformation Task Force meeting. also had four announcements, including the PG County Executive's Virtual Town Hall on Covid, the Prince George's County School Board Transformation Task Force listening session, Maryland Health Care Plans open enrollment period, and the Emergency Broadband Program, which is being replaced but still taking applications until the end of the year. All the links for more information on these announcements are posted on the Town website. She also mentioned the Rec Council will be meeting virtually and in-person in the G.Love room on December

CM Papanikolas deferred his report until the Town Meeting.

CM Brittan-Powell also deferred his report until the Town Meeting and he thanked TM Allen for attending the Tree Lighting.

CM Sweep reviewed that snow was predicted for Wednesday and that it could impact the recycling schedule. He encouraged everyone to check the Town Website and Social Media for updates. He reviewed that the Town is looking into a text message alert system to share this type of information and mentioned there are changes to the trash schedule due to the Holidays.

Resident & Community Comments

There were no resident or community comments.

Adjournment

CM Sweep moved to adjourn the meeting, seconded by CM Papanikolas. After no discussion, the motion passed unanimously. Meeting adjourned at 11:22 pm.

Town Meeting December 8, 2021 7:00PM

Call to order

Mayor Dewey called the Town Meeting to order at 7PM. This is the first in-person meeting since the start of the Covid-19 pandemic. Present were Mayor Amanda Dewey, Mayor Pro Tempore Jodie Kulpa-Eddy, Councilmember Jason Papanikolas, Councilmember Chris Brittan-Powell, and Councilmember Ethan Sweep. Also present were Town Manager Laura Allen, Town Clerk Melanie Friesen, and Committee Representatives Allison Holmes for the Berwyn Heights Education Advisory Committee (BHEAC), Debby Steele-Snyder for the Historical Committee (BHHC), and Susan Jones for the Rec Council.

Pledge of Allegiance

Announcements

Mayor Dewey reviewed that masks are rquired over the nose and mouth the entire time of the meeting, including while speaking, and that should the room reach capacity, overflow will be available in the Senior

Center.

Approval of Agenda

Mayor Dewey requested an amendment to the agenda, moving 6c to 6a. MPT Kulpa-Eddy moved to approve the agenda as amended. CM Papanikolas seconded. After no discussion, the motion passed unanimously.

Consent

CM Sweep moved to approve the Consent agenda. MPT Kulpa-Eddy seconded. After no discussion the motion passed unanimously.

Mayor & Councilmember Reports

Mayor Dewey reminded everyone that the mask mandate was extended by the County until at least late January. She encouraged everyone who is eligible to get boosters for their vaccine. She attended a meeting with Senator Cardin's Office regarding Congressional Earmarks and the new process in making requests and what is eligible. She also reviewed that Friday will be the annual employee appreciation lunch and Town Offices will be closed in the afternoon. She reviewed the upcoming Legislative Meet and Greet, Cocoa with the Popo, Letters for Santa and that Town Offices will be closed Dec 24, 27, and 28.

MPT Kulpa-Eddy recognized residents may want to show extra appreciation for people who serve the Town of Berwyn Heights, and reviewed guidance for ethical governmental gift giving.

CM Papanikolas reported that page 26 of the Bulletin has the Code Compliance article. He also highlighted two areas in the monthly department report: business license returns have decreased from 105 licenses to 49, and that while last year the Town had 207 active rental units, this year it has 187.

TM Allen responded that staff are looking at ways to encourage compliance with business licensing.

CM Brittan-Powell reported that the budget season is pending and will be taking up a great deal of time; ARPA funding discussions will be taking up time as well. He also reported hearing from residents the need to focus on people, and acknowledge and encourage the importance of social activities.

CM Sweep reported that leaf collection is going well, despite the leaf vacuum vehicle breaking down earlier in the week, and the crews are back on schedule. He reviewed that loose leaf collection will continue through the end of the month. He also expressed excitement to see Director Pudner work with students at UMD to catalogue the trees in Town. He reviewed the trash schedule changes for the week following Christmas, with recycling pick-up on December 29 and Town-wide trash day being on December 30.

Committee Reports

Education Advisory Committee: Allison Holmes reported the BHEAC has been busy this past year. They had a successful summer camp scholarship program. She reported that despite the lag in gathering feedback

from the students, they expressed excitement about the STEAM camp projects, and families noted that this program was not available in past years. The BHEAC supported 3 students to the STEAM camp. The committee may ask the Town to sponsor more students in future years. MPT Kulpa-Eddy read a few comments from the students. CM Brittan-Powell asked about the learning loss that is occurring during COVID. Ms. Holmes replied that estimates of the impact of the pandemic indicate learning loss will last the next 5 years, and that the biggest loss is in social interactions and mental health. This will be considered during the grant period and addressing learning loss will require a holistic approach. Ms. Holmes stated the BHEAC meets the 4th Monday of the month, with no meeting in December but returning in January. also reviewed the next round of education grant funding will be coming up in February. Green Team: Mayor Dewey reported that there is a holiday light recycling bin in front of Town Hall. She also attended two different Route 1 Green Team summits with Director Pudner. She reported that the Thriving Earth Exchange Invasive Species Survey has about 10 volunteers conducting the survey now. She also reported the Green Team submitted a letter of support for the County Climate Action Plan. The next meeting for the Green Team will be January 13, 2022 via Zoom.

Historical Committee: Debby Steele-Snyder reported the BHHC is having a virtual meeting on December 15. They may have a volunteer to edit their existing raw footage to produce new videos. The BHHC is making plans for a Spring Wine and Cheese event that may be either indoors or outdoors depending on the state of the pandemic. The committee is interested in getting a dedicated email address for the team. She reported that they still have wine glasses available for \$7 each and to contact Ms. Steele-Snyder if interested. The committee is also putting together an information package for people seeking grants for their historic homes, as a way to offer some guidance on the process. Lastly, she reminded everyone that Berwyn Heights was incorporated 125

Neighborhood Watch/ Emergency Preparedness: Mayor Dewey reported that they met last week and continued the trailer inventory and the goals for the trailer. There were no new financial transactions but they are still looking to purchase a generator for the trailer. She reported that the next meeting is January 5, 2022. She also reviewed holiday best practices including the house watch program.

Recreation Council: Susan Jones reported for the Rec Council and thanked everyone who came and helped make the tree lighting a success. Public Works did a fantastic job and it was so charming. She also reviewed that the Craft Fair was great and lots of people showed up to shop. The Rec Council is looking toward January and will have a regifting party. It will be Saturday January 15th from 2pm-4pm, for adults only, as wine is served. In February, they would like to

have the annual Valentine card-making and cookie-decorating on Saturday, February 12th from 2pm-4pm. She reported there will hopefully be a joint summer concert series with College Park this coming summer. The next meeting will be Tuesday the 11th and the Rec Council will be beginning the Berwyn Heights Day discussion. Please email Ms. Jones if you have ideas for BH Day.

New Business

BHEAC Education Grant Funding Recommendation(Moved to agenda item a): MPT Kulpa-Eddy gave an update on the grant funding history. Ms. Holmes gave thanks to the other members of the Committee for their support in processing the grant applications. The Committee received good applications. The BHEAC is recommending the application from BHES to improve the school garden. It would benefit a number of people within the community, as well as students and staff. The garden is intended to improve BHES' connection to the Town and residents, as well as provide sustainable food. Mayor Dewey expressed excitement about the partnership that could keep the garden going over the summer to be a provider of food. CM Brittan-Powell expressed gratitude for the garden. CM Papanikolas expressed concern that background checks are required to enter the building, even in the summer when no students are present and that the proposed garden is in an interior courtyard. CM Brittan-Powell asked if other areas of the school were considered. Ms. Holmes reported that she did not know as the grant application that was presented identified the interior courtyard. CM Sweep asked if they know how many garden beds will be installed and if students will be involved in the construction of the raised beds? Ms. Holmes replied that they don't know how many beds are planned. CM Sweep stated that he thinks this is a wonderful way to introduce new foods to students. CM Brittan-Powell moved to award the grant for \$2000 to the Berwyn Heights Elementary School for the construction of the garden. CM Papanikolas seconded. After no discussion the motion passed unanimously.

Charging Stations Agreement: Pepco Mayor Dewey reviewed the meeting on Monday, December 6th with Pepco during the worksession. TM Allen reviewed that MPT Kulpa-Eddy had concerns about the limitation on getting out of the agreement if the Town were to have issues. She reviewed the conversation with Pepco that amended the agreement to a one year commitment with the ability to withdraw anytime after that with a 90 day written notice. CM Sweep moved to approve the Pepco charging stations agreement, CM Brittan-Powell seconded. During discussion, MPT Kulpa-Eddy thanked Pepco for their prompt responsiveness after the previous worksession. The motion passed unanimously.

County Climate Action Plan Comment Letter: Mayor Dewey reviewed the Climate Action Plan process. She also briefly re-

viewed what the CAP plan entails. CM Sweep requested a change that changes one reference to "Climate Action Plan" to "CAP" as was previously identified in the letter. CM Brittan-Powell moved to approve the climate action plan letter as amended. CM Papanikolas seconded. After no discussion, the motion passed unanimously.

M-NCPPC Community Center Use Agreement Extension for Men's League Basketball: Mayor Dewey reviewed the need for the extension, given that the current Memorandum of Understanding is expiring at the end of the month. This resolution grants the Mayor the authority to execute a one year extension of the current terms of the agreement. CM Sweep moved to approve Resolution 12-2021. CM Papaniko-las seconded. During discussion MPT Kulpa-Bddy expressed gratitude for the language change recognizing the Men's League as a Town organization. The motion passed unanimously.

CM Sweep moved to adjourn the meeting. CM Papanikolas seconded. After no discussion the motion passed unanimously. The meeting adjourned 8:12 pm.

We hear you! Since the summer of 2021, the Council has been hard at work taking public comment on how the Town should spend the ARPA funds provided by the federal government.

The Town has the first allocation of funding (\$1.3 million).

The Council has developed goals for this first cycle of funding and may authorize immediate disbursement as well as funding for activities in the FY 2023 Budget that supports these goals.

Here's the list of goals they developed at the January 19, 2022 Worksession.

CODE COMPLIANCE

Maryland Lead Paint Law: Rental Property Requirements

In an effort to reduce the incidence of lead poisoning, Maryland State Law requires that all Rental Properties built before 1978, regardless of renovation history, comply with The Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE)'s Lead Poisoning Prevention Program regulations.

Lead Paint Hazards

Many homes built before 1978 have lead-based paint and are at risk for lead hazards. Dwellings built before 1950 have the highest risk. Lead from paint, chips, and dust can pose danger to the health of those exposed, especially children under the age of 6.

While lead- based paint that is in good condition and not on an impact or friction surface such as a window is usually not a hazard, deteriorating lead-based paint --peeling, chipping, chalking, cracking, or damaged paint-- needs immedi-



ate attention. Lead-based paints found on surfaces that children can access can be extremely hazardous

Lead poisoning can occur by breathing or swallowing lead dust, and by ingesting paint chips containing lead. Lead dust can form when lead-based paint is scraped, sanded, or heated. Lead dust also forms when painted surfaces containing lead get bumped or rub together.

Requirements

Owners of Town Rental Properties built before January 1, 1978 must:

- o Provide all tenants with the "Notice of Tenants Rights," and "Protect Your Family from Lead in Your Home" brochures as well as a copy of the current inspection certificate upon inception of the tenancy and every two years thereafter.
- o Be registered with the State of Maryland Department of Environment.

Registration requires a tracking number, completed application, and obtaining a Lead Free or Risk Reduction inspection certificate. Complete a renewal form annually and pay fees to MDE. To obtain a tracking number, application, or renewal form please call MDE at 410-537-4199 or 800-776-2706.

o Registration fee is \$30 per unit, annually

A new lead inspection certificate is required for any turnover in tenant or change of occupancy Compliance with the MDE's Lead Poison Prevention Program is required to obtain a Rental License. The State of Maryland, Department of Environment manages and primarily enforces the Prevention Program. The State may apply civil and administrative fees and penalties for noncompliance. The Town of Berwyn Heights is required to report noncompliance to MDE.

Highlights of the Legends and Lore of Berwyn Heights Walking Tour

In 1874 Haddaway Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church was build on land donated by Jonathan T. Walker. It was named in honor of the Reverend Samuel W. Haddaway. In the 1890's the Trustees of the Church saw the need of a "burying ground" and a cemetery was added to the grounds of the church.

In October of 1907 the janitor of the Church was burning old leaves and grass as part of the Fall clean up when a sudden gust of wind caused the fire to burn out of control. Unfortunately the Church could not be saved as it was built of wood.



Protecting our Tree Canopy




Shade trees provide many benefits for our town. For starters, trees:

Just a couple of weeks ago we all watched as drivers of tractor trailers, cars, and trucks, were stranded on I-95 in Virginia due to a snowstorm. SO, for February's article, here are some tips for traveling our roadways during winter weather. Listed below are some driving tips found on the NHTSAs website at www.NHTSA.gov/winter-driving-tips:

Snow, sleet, and ice can cause extremely dangerous road conditions. There were 440 fatal crashes and an estimated 33,000 injury crashes during 2019 during the winter months. So, Preparing yourself and your vehicle for winter weather is essential.

Some basics for winter travel first and foremost, is slow down. It is harder to control or stop your vehicle on a slick or snow-covered road. Increasing your following distance enough so that you have plenty of time and space to stop your vehicles ahead of you. Don't crowd the snowplows or travel beside the truck. Snowplows travel slowly, make wide turns, stop often, overlap lanes, and exits the road frequently. If you find yourself behind a snowplow, stay far enough behind it and use caution if you must pass it. It is always better though to stay behind the snowplows. They have the salt mix they put down on the roads and the snowplows to push the snow off the

What to do in an Emergency? If you are stopped or stranded in wintery weather, stay focused on yourself and your passengers, your car and your surroundings.

Stay with your vehicle and don't overexert yourself

Let your vehicle be seen – put your bright markers on the antenna or windows and keep the interior dome light on Be mindful of carbon monoxide poisoning; make sure your exhaust pipe is clear of any snow and run your car only sporadically – just long enough to stay warm; don't run your car for long periods of time with the windows up or in an enclosed space

Some tips for Preparing your Vehicle for Winter Weather & Traveling Our Roadways:

Check your headlights, brake lights, turn signals, emergency flashers and interior lights; also check trailer brake lights and turn signals, if necessary

Make sure your vehicle's reservoir is full of high-quality winter fluid with de-icer before winter weather hits as you can go through lots of windshield wiper fluid in a single snowstorm; make sure defrosters and all windshield wipers work and replace any worn blades; consider installing heavy duty winter wipers if you live in an area that gets a lot of snow and ice

Ensure you have enough coolant in your vehicle and that it meets the manufacturer's specifications; see your owner's manual for recommendations; check the cooling system for leaks, test the coolant, and drain or replace the old coolant; you may also want to check with your mechanic for a tune up and ask them to check for leaks, badly worn hoses or other needed parts, repairs, and replacements

SO, BEFORE YOU GO AND DO ANY TRAVELING -

Stock your vehicle:

Carry items in your vehicle to handle common winter driving related tasks plus supplies you might need in an emergency such as:

A snow shovel, broom and/or ice scraper

Sand or Kitty litter in case your vehicle gets stuck

Jumper cables, flashlight, and warning devices (flares, emergency markers)

Blankets for protection from the cold, and

A cell phone and charger, water, food, and any necessary medications

Gas Up or Plug It In:

Keep your gas tank close to full whenever possible

For electric and hybrid electric vehicles as well as gasoline vehicles, decrease the drain on the battery; lower temperatures drain the batteries

Plan your Routes

YOU KNOW THE RULES - DO NOT TEXT OR DRIVE DISTRACTED; obey posted speed limits; and always drive sober; both alcohol and drugs can impair safe and responsible driving by affecting things such as coordination, judgement, perception, and reaction time; AND REMEMBER, always wear your seatbelt!!!!!!

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



The Invasive Vine Survey Results are In!

Volunteers looked for invasive vines like English Ivy that are threatening our tall shade trees. Observing from the street, volunteers gathered 615 data points from across Town! A scientist analyzed the data.

This pie chart shows about how many Berwyn Heights homes have trees that are threatened by invasive vines. Fortunately, most homes have minimal vine presence. However, over a third of homes have trees that seem to be threatened.


