

BETTIE PROSISE



M. Elizabeth “Bettie” Prosise (1931-2016) passed away unexpectedly on Tuesday, January 26, 2016. The youngest of three daughters of John Lorenzo and Ruth Joy Sauer, Bettie was born and grew up in the Victorian house at 5625 Ruatan Street. She attended the two-room school at 5814 Ruatan Street, and graduated from Greenbelt High School in 1948 before it became Greenbelt Junior High School and then Greenbelt Middle School.

Bettie married Donald Lewis “Buddy” Prosise (1929-1996) on Sept. 15, 1951. They had three children, which they raised in Berwyn Heights. They were active in the community, coaching and cheering their childrens' Boys & Girls Club teams and improving local schools. Bettie loved Berwyn Heights and had many stories to share about the country village that it was before the second World War. (See BHHC, page15.) She was particularly fond of the Berwyn Heights Day parade and participated in it as long as she was able.

Bettie was a member of Berwyn Presbyterian Church, where she served as a Deacon and sang in the choir. Her musical talents led her to join the Vienna Falls Chorus of Sweet Adelines in the late 1960's, and later the Bowie Senior Chorale. The Sweet Adelines sang at her funeral. She leaves to cherish her memory her children Kelly, Michael and Scott, her grandchildren Megan and Corey, her sisters Ruth Ellsworth and Leah Harcourt, her church family, her musical communities, and many friends.

Memorial services were held at Berwyn Presbyterian Church and she was laid to rest at National Cemetery.

Worksession January 4, 2016

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Jodie Kulpa-Eddy, Mayor Pro Tem (MPT) Chris Rasmussen, Councilmembers (CMs) Patricia Dennison, Maria Robles and Lynn White. Also present were Town Administrator (TA) Jessica Cowles, Code Supervisor Freddie Glass and Clerk Kerstin Harper.

1. Mayor

Announcements: There were none.

Calendar: The starting time for the April and May Town meetings was corrected to 7:30 p.m.

Minutes: On a motion by CM Dennison and second by CM White, the December 21 worksession minutes were approved 5 to 0.

Department reports: CM Rasmussen reported that he received an inquiry as to whether the Town is looking into obtaining permission for residents, who are not students or faculty, to ride UMD buses. College Park and Greenbelt have MOUs contracting with the University of Maryland to permit their residents to use the buses at a cost of \$6,000 per year per community. He has asked TA Cowles to come up with a rough estimate of the subsidy per Berwyn Heights rider, and to check with the University if Berwyn Heights might qualify for a lower annual fee based on its smaller size and fewer riders. Mayor Kulpa-Eddy said that people can already purchase UMD shuttle passes at a cost of \$150 per year.

CM Dennison announced a first time gifting party sponsored by the Recreation Council on January 23. She also reported the winners of the holiday decorating contest, who will receive a gift certificate: 5804 Ruatan Street had the best decorated house, 8502 Paxton Court the best decorated yard, and 8708 60th Avenue was the best overall.

Mayor Kulpa-Eddy said that a video of a Berwyn Heights police officer has been posted on the web by a person who thought the officer acted in an aggressive manner. The case was litigated and the complaint was dismissed. Further, Private Hollowell will be promoted to Private 1st Class this week. Lastly, the police station had water from an overflowing toilet on the floor above run through the ceiling onto the receptionist desk. Computers were damaged and will have to be replaced. A cleanup team has disinfected the affected areas, but carpets, paneling and ceiling tiles may

have to be replaced. This raises a question that has come up again recently: whether the police department should be moved to a location over which the Town has control. It is something she would like the Council to consider during the budget season.

Citizen comments: Mayor Kulpa-Eddy received a request to place an announcement about an aerobics class at the Community Center into the next Bulletin. The class may be cancelled if not enough people sign up. CM White received a complaint about a safety hazard on a private driveway that may affect Town property as well. She has referred the matter to the Public Works Department.

DPIE presentation on zoning: Mayor Kulpa-Eddy welcomed Bill Edelen, Code Officer in the Prince George's County Department of Permitting, Inspections and Enforcement (DPIE), and Renee Blasio, Supervisor and expert on rental issues. Mr. Edelen said that the Town requested a visit from DPIE representatives to answer some questions about commercial vehicles and multifamily homes, which he will try to answer. He will begin with an overview of DPIE's zoning enforcement function, noting that zoning regulations are adopted by the Prince George's County Council and the Park & Planning Department.

Mr. Edelen said that DPIE has had several conversations with former Mayor Calvo on the issue of commercial vehicles, which generally are not allowed to be parked in a residential zone per County code. However, in a municipality, Prince George's code officers only come out upon request. If a complaint is filed, a County code officer will investigate the situation and, if a violation is found, will issue a notice with instructions to remedy the violation. Normally, the code enforcement division will attempt to work with the property owners or tenants to solve the problem. Failing that, a fine of between \$250 and \$1,000 can be given. If the violation continues after fines have been exhausted, the matter will be taken to court to obtain formal permission to remove the vehicle.

Mr. Edelen then explained which commercial vehicles are in violation of residential zoning rules:

- More than 800 lbs in weight
- load space greater than 300 cubic feet
- dual rear axles
- lettering greater than 4inches

tall advertising a business

- box trucks, dump trucks, tow trucks, trucks with trailers, commercial buses possessing above characteristics

An exception is made for a commercial vehicle of this type if it is parked in a wholly enclosed garage. However, only one such vehicle is allowed under this circumstance. The exception does not apply to vehicles covered with a fitted car cover, or tarp. Recreational vehicles, and boats and trailers are generally permitted.

In response to questions, Mr. Edelen said that zoning regulations are established by the County Council for various reasons, some because of safety concerns. The Code Enforcement Division only enforces commercial vehicle violations on private property, while the police enforce them on public streets. The enforcement process can take from several days to several months, depending on the quality of the information received with the initial complaint. Mr. Edelen said the County wants to work with municipalities on enforcing zoning violations and has different arrangements with different cities. If Berwyn Heights is so inclined, DPIE can notify the Town when a complaint is received. The Council and Code Supervisor indicated that they would like to be informed.

Code Supervisor Glass raised the issue of multi-family homes. He said that Berwyn Heights administers its own program of rental licensing and inspections. Most rental homes in town are converted single family homes, where rooms are rented to up to five unrelated tenants. There are a few houses, however, that likely qualify as multi-family homes and may exist in violation of the zoning code.

Ms. Blasio and Mr. Edelen said that multi-family homes have a separate entrance to each apartment. They require a Use of Occupancy Permit to certify that the apartment house meets local zoning and safety requirements and operates legally. DPIE has Use of Occupancy permits on file, some going back to the 1950s. He can check to see if any of the Berwyn Heights homes in question have one. Mayor Kulpa-Eddy thanked Mr. Edelen and Ms. Blasio for explaining the County's zoning enforcement process.

Four Cities agenda: Mayor Kulpa-Eddy noted that Chad Williams will give a presentation on the Prince George's County zoning regulations rewrite, which is likely to take up the entire meeting. She suggested, and the Council agreed, to add approval of the FBI promotional

video to the agenda.

2. Administration

Bulletin cover: The following items were approved for the February Bulletin cover: theme Town Council Elections; announcements of candidate filing deadline, family arts & crafts event; Boys & Girls Club registration.

MML convention hotel reservations: Hotel reservations at the Princess Bay-side for 5 councilmembers and one staff were confirmed.

Guidance on the FY 2017 budget: Mayor Kulpa-Eddy said that re-assessments of real property are coming in between 9%-10% higher than in previous years. In recent years, department directors have been asked to provide budget options for level funding of programs and 5% and/ or 10% funding reductions because of low real estate tax revenues. This year, directors might be asked to provide alternative budgets reflecting a 4% and 7% increase, in addition to a hold-the-line option, based on a more positive revenue picture.

TA Cowles said she has not gained the impression that the directors are planning major new initiatives. She recommended keeping the budget requests simple and asking for only one alternative to a flat-line budget, such as a 5% increase. The Council agreed.

In discussions, the following points were made: The police department is looking into purchasing body cameras for its officers and related IT upgrades. Directors will be asked to look for grants to help pay for new initiatives. An alternative to increasing spending is to lower the real property tax rate--to keep it at a constant yield rate--which would maintain resident's property tax bills at their current amount. Apart from funding department level initiatives, competitive salary increases, a Town-owned public safety building and road repairs were mentioned as possible budget goals.

At 8:41 p.m., the Council took a 5 minute break.

Citizen comments, continued: MPT Rasmussen said he received a complaint from a resident about unusually high water bills and asked who the owners might contact to seek redress. TA Cowles and CM Dennison said they also heard complaints from residents who have received very high WSSC bills. TA Cowles will contact the WSSC municipal liaison and try to find out how to appeal such bills.

FBI Headquarters letter: Mayor Kulpa-

Eddy explained that she has written a letter to comment on the draft Environmental Impact Statements (EIS) for the future FBI Headquarters locations released by the General Services Department (GSA) in December. She came to the conclusion that it would be best to focus on the impact the FBI Headquarters would have on Berwyn Heights, rather than point out all the advantages of Greenbelt Station over the other locations (as the developer, the media and other municipalities have already done so). Referencing Berwyn Heights' EIS scoping letter, she confined her comments to impacts on three areas.

- 1) Water Resources: Berwyn Heights agrees with the finding that impacts would be positive as the new headquarters would be built on the existing Metro parking lot, and new stormwater mitigation installations added to reduce runoff into Indian Creek and Narragansett Run.
- 2) Hazardous Materials/ Public Health & Safety: Berwyn Heights does not object to the finding that a projected increase in bicycle volumes would have no measurable long-term impact on the areas bicycle network.
- 3) Transportation, Traffic & Parking: Berwyn Heights appreciates that likely negative traffic impacts on the intersections of Greenbelt Road at 60th and 62nd Avenues have been brought to our attention. To address possible difficulties of accessing Greenbelt Road, a dedicated left turn lane has been proposed within the northbound 60th Avenue road space.

Mayor Kulpa-Eddy continued that the draft BH letter also suggests the EIS incorporate the likely positive impact of the Purple Line and disagrees that the FBI headquarters would have an adverse visual impact due to building height. Berwyn Heights does not expect a dramatic change to the visual landscape if 8 or 17 story buildings are added to already existing 18 story buildings in the vicinity. The issue of inadequate natural gas supply to the area, cited in the EIS as an adverse impact, is not mentioned in this letter, as Greenbelt and the Greenbelt Station developers are more knowledgeable about the matter and in a better position to address it.

The Council had no objections to the letter. TA Cowles was asked to finalize it

and send it out by the deadline, copying the cities of Greenbelt and College Park.

Nothing was discussed under, **3. Code Compliance, 4. Parks and Recreation, 5. Public Safety and 6. Public Works.**

The meeting was adjourned at 9:03 p.m.

Town Meeting January 13, 2016

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Kulpa-Eddy, CMs Patricia Dennison and Lynn White. Mayor Pro Tem (MPT) Chris Rasmussen and CM Maria Robles had an excused absence. Also present were Town Administrator (TA) Jessica Cowles, Chief of Police Kenneth Antolik, Treasurer Michelle Rodriguez, and Clerk Kerstin Harper.

Mayor Kulpa-Eddy led the Pledge of Allegiance.

1. Minutes

Clerk Harper read a summary of the December 9 Town meeting minutes. On a motion by CM White and second by CM Dennison, the minutes were approved 3 to 0.

2. Treasurer's Report

Treasurer Rodriguez gave the Treasurer's report for the month of December 2015.

3. Mayor's Report

Mayor Kulpa-Eddy gave a State of the Town address. She said that 2015 saw many changes on the Town Council and in staff. Former Mayor Calvo and CM Schreiber resigned to pursue job and educational opportunities that did not leave time for service on the Town Council. Luckily, their seats were filled by two residents, CMs Robles and White, who learned the job quickly. In addition, there was turnover in the leadership of the Code Compliance and Public Works Departments, but both are now under competent direction from Code Supervisor Freddie Glass and DPW Acting Director Kenneth Hall.

Despite the turnover, the Town Council and staff were able to finish several big projects. Five years in the making, the sidewalks project was finally completed and people appreciate them and the new bus stops and benches that came with it. The bikeways project is nearly done, with all bike racks and repair stations installed and construction on the emergency gen-

erators project has begun and should be finished by spring. On the legislative side, the Council was able to revise the Election Ordinance in time for the next election in May 2016. By the end of the term, she hopes to have all the priorities of the 46th Town Council checked off.

Mayor Kulpa-Eddy said the recent real property reassessments are showing an increase in home values of around 9.5% for residential properties and around 16% for commercial properties after a drop of 27% in 2010 and another 17% in 2013. This will generate more real property tax revenues, unless the Council decides to adjust the tax rate to yield the same amount of revenue as this year. With the upcoming FY 2017 budget process, directors have been asked to submit both, a hold-the-line budget option and a budget with a 5% increase in spending. Residents are welcome to give input.

Mayor Kulpa-Eddy further noted that there are further delays in repairing the pedestrian bridge, which was damaged by a construction crane last April, and may not re-open until April 2016. Other projects scheduled for this spring include a personnel manual update and continued IT improvements. Residents are requested to keep the storm water drains clear so as to facilitate runoff from melting snow and spring rains. Problems with a storm water drain can be reported to the County's Office of Highway Maintenance at 301 499 8523.

Among the big projects the next Town Council will have to tackle is the renovation of Town streets in the wake of the WSSC water main replacement project, scheduled to conclude in 2017. Coming up with a plan and options for financing the resurfacing is likely to take up a good deal of time. They will also need to monitor the impact of the Greenbelt Station development on Berwyn Heights, particularly in terms of traffic, public safety and public schools. Lastly, Mayor Kulpa-Eddy thanked her fellow councilmembers and Town staff for solving problems and working together in a positive, cooperative fashion.

4. Department Reports

Administration: TA Cowles gave the Administration Department report as MPT Rasmussen was absent. She said that the Department is finishing up a couple of capital projects, which are the Safe Routes to School sidewalks and the emergency generators. The generators should be operational in late February. The Department has also released a request for proposals for the Urban Forest Initiative and expects to receive pro-

posals by the end of next week. She and Treasurer Rodriguez are working on wrapping up the 2015 audit and working with the directors on preparing the FY 2017 budget. By the end of February, the Department expects to receive a real property tax and an income tax disbursement, the two largest sources of revenue for the Town, as well as a Highway User Revenue payment.

Code Compliance: TA Cowles gave the Code Department report, as CM Robles was absent. She said that the Code Department has worked closely with the County's Department of Permitting, Inspections and Enforcement (DPIE) in processing two condemned properties. The owners of the 58th Avenue property have contacted the Town about rehabilitating the house and are making progress in returning it to habitable condition. The Cunningham Drive property has been reviewed by the County's Office of Law and approved for demolition, which is expected to occur in the next few weeks. The Code Department is also reviewing the Rental Housing Ordinance and creating a version with proposed changes, as well as working with the County to improve service delivery of the call-a-bus.

Parks and Recreation, Education and Civic Affairs: CM Dennison said that the Recreation Council has started planning for Berwyn Heights Day and is putting out the word for volunteers. The Education Advisory Committee has been reconstituted and will next meet on January 14. Upcoming events include a Regifting Party on January 23, and a bath-themed craft event on February 6. She then announced the winners of the holiday decorating contest: 5804 Ruatan Street was chosen as best decorated house, 8502 Paxton Court as best decorated yard, and 8708 60th Avenue as best overall.

Public Health and Safety: Chief Antolik gave the monthly report on behalf of the Berwyn Heights Volunteer Fire Department (BHVFD). Ladder Truck Company 14 was named busiest in the County with 1,117 runs in 2015 while the BHVFD rescue squad handled a total of 6,110 runs overall. At the January meeting, President Hurley appointed a Rescue Squad Committee, which will design and develop specifications for a new Heavy Rescue Squad. They will be ready when the Department is notified about a grant award that will help pay for the vehicle.

Chief Antolik continued with the monthly police activities report for December. There were 5 Part I offenses, 2 burglar-

ies and 3 larcenies, as opposed to the 5 year average of 4.8. Year to date, Part I offenses numbered 78, which is somewhat higher than the 5 year average of 72. The police also issued 171 state and municipal citations and 234 speed camera tickets. The police are in the process of solving a December 23, 2015 burglary on Berwyn Road, where several musical instruments were stolen. Some of the instruments were recovered from a Guitar Center in Virginia, where they had been pawned.

Chief Antolik also highlighted developments in the last 10 year period. Serious crimes declined significantly after 2010, when they hit a high with 139 Part I offenses, and are holding steady with annual rates ranging between 60-80. Last year, Iris Cruz was hired as new police clerk, and Thomas Hollowell and Yomira Ramirez as police officers. Officers attended training and conferences to maintain their certifications. Looking forward, the Department is working on a policy for body cameras and plans to continue regular meetings with community groups, i.e. NW/EP, Seniors, and Berwyn Heights Elementary School, as well as with affiliated agencies.

Public Works: CM White reported that 2015 saw many changes in the Public Works Department. A new interim director, Kenneth Hall, was hired as well as several new employees. Several vehicles were surplused to make room for a new trash truck and dump truck. Last month, the crew patched potholes, installed a radio in the new trash truck and emergency lighting in the trucks designated for snow plowing. The Department is now working on its FY 2017 budget and is planning improving service delivery and possibly launching a beautification initiative.

5. Committee Reports

Historical Committee: Clerk Harper, who chairs the Historical Committee, said that the Committee is planning an event that will feature a series of oral histories with Town residents, which will take place sometime later in spring. The Committee is also working on its next street marker, which will feature the Berwyn Heights Association. In the course of researching the topic, a few interesting photos from 1920 were found and published in the January Bulletin and on the BHHC website.

Neighborhood Watch/Emergency Preparedness: Mayor Kulpa-Eddy reported that the NW/EP Committee elected new officers at its last meeting. Merrill Weinrich and Mike Attick were elected co

-chairs, Helen Weinrich Secretary and Shirley Attick Treasurer. On February 6 and 7, a CERT training course will be held at the Landover Public Safety Complex through the Prince George's Office on Homeland Security. People may call Mike Attick for more information and to register. The next meeting will be on February 3.

Recreation Council: CM Dennison said that the President of the Recreation Council, Tim Tormoen, will attend the next worksession and discuss Berwyn Heights Day plans. There is a need for volunteers to help with planning and organizing the event, as some long-serving members have retired. Residents are welcome to attend the worksession and share their ideas.

8. Citizens Discussion

TA Cowles noted that Administration Department will have a party for Darlene Erickson on January 28, to honor her 25 years of service.

**Draft Minutes — Worksession
January 19, 2016**

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Jodie Kulpa-Eddy, Mayor Pro Tem (MPT) Chris Rasmussen, Councilmembers (CMs) Patricia Dennison, Maria Robles and Lynn White. MPT Rasmussen arrived 15 minutes late due to work-related reasons. Also present were Town Administrator (TA) Jessica Cowles, Clerk Kerstin Harper, and resident Cody Lieuwen.

1. Mayor

Announcements: CM Dennison's son James was married today. Long-time employee Darlene Erickson will be retiring at the end of January.

Calendar: No changes were made.

Minutes: There were none.

Department reports: CM Robles reported that Code Supervisor has made an effort to count the number of commercial vehicles that may be in violation of the zoning code. Mayor Kulpa Eddy suggested the Department compare week-

days and weekends and monitor properties for a period of time to determine if it is an ongoing situation. CM Robles said a stop work order was issued for the historic Sportland property, because the contractor had started to work without a permit. Mayor Kulpa-Eddy asked if there are plans to hire a new part-time officer before spring, when code activity tends to pick up. CM Robles replied that Code Supervisor Glass and TA Cowles are discussing the options. CM Dennison reported that the Recreation Council canceled the re-gifting party due to the forecast snow storm. The Education Advisory Council will meet on February 11. It has been proposed to survey the student population in Berwyn Heights to determine which schools they attend.

Mayor Kulpa-Eddy said that a major snowstorm is forecast for the coming weekend. Police will be on duty and be able to check on people. CM White said that the Public Works Department is also preparing for the snow. They have road salt on hand and are devising a staffing plan. CM Robles noted that residents are requested to keep their cars off the road where possible to facilitate snow plowing. Cars may be parked on unpaved surfaces in the yard when snow falls.

MPT Rasmussen said that with Ms. Erickson leaving Town service, the Administration Department is thinking about how to carry out those responsibilities. Cleaning contractors and private caterers are being considered as options.

Citizen comments: CM Dennison received a comment opposing a possible permit requirement for felling trees. CM Robles received a comment about whether a particular tree on her property is in the Town right of way and therefore the Town's responsibility to cut down. She told the resident to contact the Town to make the determination. CM White received comments on unusually high water bills. TA Cowles recommended contacting the manager for the WSSC water main replacement project about it, as it may be related. She will follow up with the WSSC government relations manager. MPT Rasmussen received a comment that Town staff are paid well enough and don't need a raise in compensation.

2. Code Compliance

Variance request 8504 60th Avenue: TA Cowles explained that the owners of the property at 8504 60th Avenue are requesting a variance for lot coverage and setback of a 2-story shed, which

does not meet Prince George's County zoning regulations. Zoning rules require that not more than 30% of a lot may be covered by impervious surfaces, including homes, accessory structures and driveways, and that a structure must be set back at least 2 feet from the property line. The County Board of Appeals asks municipalities to make recommendations on variances before issuing a ruling.

The shed, presumed to have been built in the 1980s by a previous owner of the property, was cited by the County in 2013 for not having a permit. The current owner appealed, and the matter came before the Town Council, which recommended to the Board of Appeals that an investigative fee and certification from a structural engineer as to the soundness of the structure be waived because the shed was not built by the current owner.

Property owner Cody Lieuwen explained that he bought the property with his wife in 2009 with the shed in its present condition. In 2013 he received a violation from the County. He was surprised because he had made no changes to the shed. The County insisted on the appropriate permits, which he is now trying to obtain. Before permits can be issued, the required variances must be approved, including one for height of the shed not mentioned in the appeal.

In response to questions from the Council, Mr. Lieuwen said that he has talked to the neighbor whose property abuts his and is nearest to the shed. The neighbor has no problems with the setback. The shed serves as a garage and also contains gardening supplies. His property has no installations to slow rainwater runoff, except a rain barrel, that could serve as an offset for the 42% of impervious surfaces on his lot. He noted that rainwater does not runoff into the street but tends to pool in his back yard and soak into the ground. The electric wiring in the shed also needs a permit, which he intends to get once the zoning variances are approved. The County's zoning inspector has looked at the shed and the electric wiring and found no cause for concern.

CM Dennison moved and MPT Rasmussen seconded to support approval of the variances. The motion passed 5 to 0. TA Cowles will send a letter to the Board of Appeals informing them of the Council's decision.

3. Parks and Recreation

Berwyn Heights Day plans (discussed out of order): Mayor Kulpa-Eddy welcomed Tim Tormoen, President of the

Recreation Council for a discussion of Berwyn Heights Day plans. Mr. Tormoen said that the Recreation Council lost several active members and at this point has only 3-4 members who are available to plan Berwyn Heights Day. They are stretched very thin to carry out all the different responsibilities associated with Berwyn Heights Day preparations. Mr. Tormoen will be responsible for overall coordination and soliciting sponsors, and is sharing responsibilities for games and vendors. Fun Run, pancake breakfast, bake sale, concert and vendors are covered by volunteers from the Recreation Council and various clubs. However, at this point there is no one to take on the parade.

MPT Rasmussen said the Town may want to re-evaluate the Berwyn Heights Day program to decide if it wants to run the full slate of activities and utilize Town staff to fill in the gaps, or reconfigure the event to be managed by a smaller group of volunteers. In discussions, the following suggestions were made:

- Approach Town organizations and ask if they would organize a particular activity;
- Ask the police department for assistance with the parade, as they have organized it in the past;
- Scale down the parade to make organization less time consuming;
- Replace parade with another activity, such as a block party;
- Ask all Town employees to help and compensate with comp time;
- Appropriate more money to hire entertainers;
- Invite additional food trucks;
- Identify additional craft vendors and invite them.

It was agreed to check with the Police Department, other Town staff and Town committees for assistance with Berwyn Heights Day.

PGC zoning rewrite: Mayor Kulpa-Eddy said she reviewed Module 1 of the Prince George's County zoning rewrite for potential impacts on Berwyn Heights. Module 1 redefines the land uses permitted for each planning zone. The current single family residential zone, R-55, that applies for most of Berwyn Heights, will become S-6.7. The current commercial shopping zone will become one of 3 proposed categories: commercial neighborhood, commercial service, and commercial office, while the current light industrial zone will become industrial

employment, or I-E.

Mayor Kulpa-Eddy continued that most proposed zones are compatible with uses in current zones, with some exceptions: 1) beekeeping is considered agricultural production and is prohibited; 2) poultry is allowed on a minimum ½ acre lot; 3) multi-family dwellings are allowed in commercial and industrial zones; 4) nightclubs, indoor shooting ranges, pawn shops and tattoo parlors are allowed in commercial and industrial zones; and 5) vehicle storage and salvage yards are only allowed in H-I, heavy industrial zones.

If Berwyn Heights disagrees with any proposed use, it needs to weigh in now and request the definition of the new zones be modified. Once the new zoning code is adopted, there will not be an opportunity to appeal. Another issue that may come up is that currently allowed uses in an R-55 zone, such as beekeeping, will not be allowed under the new zoning rules. It is unclear if this type of activity would be grandfathered in. Either way, the Council should communicate whether it has a preference for uses in zones proposed for Berwyn Heights.

MPT Rasmussen said it would be useful to have a more detailed definition of some of the proposed uses. For example, he would like to know if the R-55 successor allows in-law suites and other types of accessory structures that accommodate extended families living together. He also suggested that M-NCPPC Planner Chad Williams be asked to provide revised zoning maps when he gives a presentation at the next Four Cities meeting. TA Cowles said she will ask for a map but does not think it will be ready at this stage.

2. Code Compliance, continued

Call-a-bus agreement: TA Cowles explained that the Town operates a 16-seat call-a-bus that is intended for transporting seniors and people with disabilities, who cannot use regular buses, to nearby destinations. It is also used by community organizations for special events. The bus is provided by the County, while the Town pays for operating expenses. The Town has had an agreement with the County going back to the 1980s, and must renew the agreement to remain eligible for the program. There is no additional expense associated with renewing the agreement and insurance will be through LGIT's general liability insurance. The agreement would also make the Town eligible for a new bus provided by the County. Should this require a contribution from the Town, the

appropriation would have to come from the Council. CM Dennison moved and CM Robles seconded to sign the new call-a-bus agreement. The motion passed 5 to 0.

Nothing was discussed under **3. Parks and Recreation, 4. Public Safety** and **5. Public Works.**

6. Administration

Candidates' packet: Clerk Harper explained the contents of a candidates' packet each Councilmember was given in the event they run for Town Council. The packet contains a petition of candidacy and financial disclosure form, which candidates have to file with the Town by March 1. As background an election schedule, Election Ordinance and Town Charter are also included. In response to questions, Clerk Harper said that a Candidates' Night will be held in April, and that there are no guidelines on campaign financing. However, the Ethics Ordinance sets forth guidelines for ethical conduct of elected officials, including financial disclosures.

It was agreed that ordinances and charter sections relevant to the election process will be referenced on an election fact sheet. Candidacies will be made public on the day of the filing deadline. Those wanting information about the election or a candidate packet should contact Clerk Harper at the Town office.

Student Mock Town Council Meeting: Mayor Kulpa-Eddy explained that the Berwyn Heights Elementary School guidance counselor has asked if the Council would consider engaging students with a different type program, as the preparations for this event are very labor intensive.

Clerk Harper said she has looked into possible alternatives. The Maryland Municipal League (MML) has developed a well-defined shadowing program for municipalities that can be viewed at the MML website. Greenbelt has a student quiz about its city government, and some cities are using scavenger hunts to familiarize students with their town. Clerk Harper was asked to consult with teachers and students at the elementary school and find out their preferences.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:20 p.m.

BERWYN HEIGHTS HISTORICAL COMMITTEE

ORAL HISTORIES RESUME

The BHHC has resumed work on its oral history program and is producing a highlights video of the interviews conducted with a number of long-time residents of Berwyn Heights. A few of those interviewed have since passed away, including most recently Bettie Prosize. Her memories about growing up in Berwyn Heights, supplemented by her children's recollections, are summarized here and give a flavor of the time.



Bettie Prosize was born and raised in one of the Victorian houses (see drawing attached) that were built by the Charlton Heights Improvement Company during the late 19th century. The house was heated by two coal stoves on the main floor. There was no heat upstairs and, of course, no air conditioning.

Bettie and her two sisters Ruth Ellsworth and Leah Harcourt grew up helping tend the half acre family farm, one of many scattered across the Town. The family had a large chicken coop, raised pigs and goats, and grew their own fruits and vegetables. To the left of the house was the largest strawberry field in the Town, and to the right and the rear a huge garden of corn, beans, squash, different types of melons, apple and pear trees. The garden also yielded many Indian artifacts every time it was plowed.

The sisters attended the two-room school house on Ruatan Street when it had some 20 - 28 students enrolled in grades 1-7, then went to Greenbelt High School, before it became Greenbelt Junior High School and later Greenbelt Middle School. In summer, Berwyn Heights' children would often spend time at, and in Indian Creek. Then, the stream was deep and clear and had fish in it. For entertainment, Bettie and her friends would sometimes walk to the newly opened movie theater in (old) Greenbelt and watch news reels of World War II battles.

During World War I Bettie's father served as a soldier, and during World War II her mother was a Civil Defense Air Raid Warden for their block of Ruatan Street, which took her on nightly patrols to enforce the black-out laws. The family always flew the American flag at the front door. Like her parents, Bettie was a patriot and loved Independence Day. She also participated in Berwyn Heights Day parades as long as she was able. During a family reunion, Bettie recalled the day when President Roosevelt drove up Pontiac Street, the roof down on his convertible, and waved to them with a big smile...
