New Old History Unveiled

Did you know that George Washington was a frequent tavern visitor to Bladensburg? Well, at the “Beyond the Battle Symposium” we learned of one 1790s tavern run by an African American woman by the name of Margaret Adams, whose establishment was most preferred by Washington and his family. We also discovered that another Bladensburg tavern keeper launched the first manned hot air balloon in North America in 1784. Experts in archaeology, anthropology, agriculture, along with historians, researchers, and artists shared their fascinating research, shedding light upon the daily lives of Prince Georgians from all walks of life before, during, and after the War of 1812.

**“Slavery in Maryland”
Guest Speaker: Maya D. Davis**

Maya Davis is a Research Archivist in the Legacy of Slavery in Maryland division at the Maryland State Archives. Some of her projects include researching the Underground Railroad in Maryland and slaves escapes during the War of 1812. Maya currently serves as a member of the Harriet Tubman Park and Visitor Center exhibition team and is the Vice Chair of the Annapolis 1864 Commission to Commemorate the Emancipation of Slaves in Maryland. Prior to her arrival at the Archives, Maya was on staff at the City Museum of Washington, D.C.
