

Reporting Street Light Outages

If you notice a street light near you that is not coming on, is dim or flickers, you can now report it through Pepco's website:

https://pepco.streetlightoutages.com/map/default.html.



Using Pepco's mapping app, zoom in to street level to view green light icons, or enter address for a specific light you want to report in the search box. Once you have located the problem light, hover the cursor over it until the information box appears. Click on it and enter the information requested, including a pole number or nearest street address. After submitting the form, the reported light is indicated by a red icon on the map. Repairs typically take between 15 to 30 days, depending on what type of repairs are needed.

Alternatively, call Pepco's Customer Service: 202-833-7500. In an emergency, such as downed poles or wires, call 1-877-737-2662 or (Spanish) 1-800-877-1264.

Worksession August 6, 2018

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Lynn White, Mayor Pro Tem Stephen Isler, and Councilmembers Jason Papanikolas and Ethan Sweep. Also present were Interim Town Administrator (TA) Mike McLaughlin, Public Works Director Kenneth Hall, Clerk Kerstin Harper, McDonald's Representatives Daniel Lynch and Joe Di-Marco and citizens.

2. Discussion Items

McDonald's redevelopment site plan: McDonald's Representative Dan Lynch presented a revised site plan for the proposed reconstruction of the McDonald's restaurant at 6219 Greenbelt Road. The Town Council received a presentation and supported an earlier version of the redevelopment plan last year, and the Prince George's County Planning Board approved the detailed site plan in May 2017. Since then, McDonald's has decided to use a different architectural style for the new restaurant, which will result in different materials being used for the roof and siding. The layout of the site, storm water facilities and dimensions of the building will remain the same. Since the change is mostly stylistic, McDonald's hopes to get the revisions approved at the Park & Planning staff level, with construction expected to start in summer 2019. The Town is requested to give input.

In discussion, Councilmembers and citizens asked, and Mr. Lynch and Mr. Di-Marco answered questions about traffic flow, parking, pedestrian safety, and building materials. The Council had no objections to the proposed changes and agreed to send a letter of support to Park & Planning.

resurfacing Street vendor: McLaughlin and Public Works Director Hall brought a proposal to select street resurfacing vendors for Phase I of the Town's street repair program. They recommended the Town not go out to bid itself but "piggyback" onto a Prince George's County contract to get a better price. While the Town Charter does not mention this method of contracting, the Town has piggybacked onto State and County contracts for purchasing police and public works vehicles. Two County street resurfacing contracts are currently available for piggybacking: VMP Construction of Lanham, MD and NZI Construction of Beltsville, MD. Both vendors have done a lot of municipal street repair work.

Mayor White read Section 806 of the

Town Charter, specifying a competitive bidding process for construction projects. She said she considers the process set forth in the Charter to be more relevant than the process by which vehicles may have been purchased in the past.

Director Hall said the County's bidding process is also competitive and probably more stringent than the Town's. Once the County has identified the vendors that best meet the requirements for a particular service it often makes the contracts available to municipalities, extending the same pricing and terms. The VMP and NZI contracts that are included in the background documentation detail the unit prices for various aspects of street renovation work, highlighting those items of interest to the Town. Overall, VMP construction has the lower price for the package of work the Town is interested in. For that reason, it is recommended the Council utilize the VMP contract. Town Administrator Mike McLaughlin further recommended that the Town utilize the bond funds for Phase I of the road renovations and keep the infrastructure reserve funds for Phase II work. This would give the Town maximum flexibility on how to use these funds.

MPT Isler, CM Papanikolas and CM Sweep said they are comfortable with piggybacking onto the County contract and employ VMP Construction for the Town's street work. Mayor White requested a description of the County's bidding process to ensure it meets the requirements set forth in the Town Charter.

The Council agreed to place the awarding of the contract on the next Town meeting agenda for approval. It was also agreed not to include driveway apron repairs in the project unless aprons are damaged by curb and gutter work, or the home owner requests, and pays for replacement. The project start date was set for August 13. Prior to the start date, Director Hall will provide the Council with an updated list of streets to be repaired, deliver fliers to homeowners and post signs on streets announcing the construction.

There ensued discussion about the recommendation to use bond funds for Phase I and infrastructure reserve funds for Phase II. TA McLaughlin said the Town will receive enough Highway User Revenue (HUR) to pay down the bond. This would leave money in the infrastructure reserve for Phase II, future road repairs or other infrastructure projects. Mayor White and resident Phil Ventura expressed skepticism about this approach and the need for using bond fund-

ing at all. MPT Isler and CM Sweep expressed concern about the consequences of pulling out of the bond issue at this late stage.

Briefing on bond issue debt service: TA McLaughlin gave an overview of the terms of the \$1.1 million bond issue the previous Council authorized through the Maryland Local Government Infrastructure Financing Program. The program offers an affordable way to borrow money for capital projects by pooling debt from multiple local governments and accessing the bond market through the Maryland Department of Housing & Community Development (DHCD). This results in lower interest rates and administrative costs.

Interest rates on this bond issue are expected to be 3.15%. Annual debt service is calculated at \$128,400 to be paid with a combination of HUR and infrastructure reserve funds. The FY 2019 budget sets aside \$116,000 for debt service and the Town anticipates receiving approximately \$113,000 in HUR this year and \$140,400 in FY 2020, according to MML estimates. HUR levels should remain stable because the General Assembly passed legislation earlier this year committing State funding for HUR through 2024.

In discussion, Mayor White expressed her reservations about the bond issue. She thinks it is a bad idea to borrow money when the Town has reserves to pay for Phase I repairs and is able to save money for the next phase. She asked what documents still need to be signed to finalize the bond issue. TA McLaughlin said the Town will be asked to sign an agreement in which the Town confirms the amount of money borrowed and the commitment to pay it back.

Phil Ventura, 57th Avenue, asked what the total amount of debt service is over the term of the bond. CM Sweep replied that amount would be 10 x the annual debt service, or \$1,284,000, i.e. \$1.1 million in principal and \$184,000 in interest. MPT Isler said the bond issue need no longer be debated since it has already been authorized by the previous Council. CM Papanikolas said he finds the cost of the bond to be reasonable. Thinking long term, the Town might be better served to get out in front of road repairs because the cost of repaving streets will go up over time. MPT Isler, CM Papanikolas and CM Sweep were of the opinion it would be difficult, inefficient and disruptive to complete the road repair program by saving up for small chunks of street repair work to be performed every year.

2020 Census Complete Count Committee: Mayor White explained that Census representatives gave a presentation on the 2020 Census at the last Four Cities Coalition meeting. They encouraged localities to set up Complete Count Committees made up of various community stakeholders to ensure the best count possible. The usual under-counts result in the loss of federal and state funds that are based on population. The Council is requested to consider setting up such a committee for Berwyn Heights.

CM Papanikolas and CM Sweep said they support the idea but want to explore a collaborating with the Four Cities in setting up a Committee. Meg Miller-Shane, Quality of Life Commission chair, said this might be something the Commission could take on. She offered to bring it up at the next Commission meeting and report back to Council. The Council agreed.

Joining PTA's of local schools: Mayor White said at last Four Cities Coalition meeting, participants discussed the closer collaboration of the member cities' Education Advisory Committees to more effectively advocate for local schools. It was suggested that municipalities join the PTAs of the schools their students attend. Mayor White said she thinks it this is a great way to support local schools and asked if the Council agrees. CM Papanikolas and MPT Isler both favored the Council's closer collaboration with local schools but thought this should include participating in PTA meetings.

In discussion, the point was made that PTA rules preclude the Council from joining a PTA as a body, but Councilmembers can join on an individual basis for a fee of \$10 per year. It was also noted that the Town has given grants to Berwyn Heights Elementary School in the past, but the current PTA may not be aware of available funding. Clerk Harper said the Council's public relations line item has been used to award grants to schools upon request. Last year, the Council supported a science program at BHES and a mentoring program at Parkdale High School.

Voting protocols at PGCMA and MML: Mayor White said she would like this Council to come up with a voting protocol when they attend PGCMA or MML meetings. The previous Council at one point discussed voting protocols for meetings of the Prince George's County Municipal Association (PGCMA) if not all Councilmembers attend. Clerk Harper was asked to confirm how the previous

Councils handled the voting and report back at the next worksession. At that time, the Council may also designate a Councilmember to attend PGCMA meetings.

TA McLaughlin said, at the MML fall conference, members adopt MML's legislative priorities for the coming legislative session. MML rules allow for proxy voting to get as much input as possible. If Councilmembers cannot attend, municipal staff or another municipality can be authorized to vote on behalf of the municipality.

MML fall conference attendance: Mayor White and CM Papanikolas will attend the conference. MPT Isler and CM Sweep have other commitments.

3. Minutes

On a motion by CM Sweep and second by CM Papanikolas, the July 2 worksession minutes were approved 4 to 0. The July 11 Town meeting minutes were distributed.

4. Announcements/ Department Reports

Mayor White reported that Berwyn Heights hosted the Four Cities Coalition meeting last week, where County Councilwoman Glaros gave a legislative update, Census Bureau staff presented on the 2020 Census and the Branchville Volunteer Fire Department requested support for the re-instatement of career fire fighters to tits station. Mayor White attended a Berwyn Heights Volunteer Fire Department (BHVFD) celebration of the Yvorra Leadership Development Foundation, attended by BHPD Chief Antolik and Cpl. Krouse as well as Prince George's County professional and volunteer fire fighters association chiefs. Mayor White also received a citizen comment about possible illegal activities at the hockey rink. She concluded with announcements of upcoming events.

MPT Isler reported that he has met with all department directors, as well as the BHVD's Chief McCoy. With TA McLaughlin he discussed some changes in the Administration Department, including reformatting the meeting minutes. He and CM Papanikolas will help out at the grills during National Night Out tomorrow, the Woo Yeahs will give a rock concert at Sports Park on Sunday, and BHPD will host a Senior appreciation lunch on August 21.

CM Papanikolas reported that he, MPT Isler and TA McLaughlin met with Code Supervisor Glass to discuss how to improve the reporting of code activities and communication with residents. Currently, the Department is down one officer and

may take longer to perform rental inspections. CM Sweep announced that the Town is accepting applications for to fill the vacant Council seat until August 15.

A home owner said he is here to follow up on a code appeal he first brought before the Council in April. He was asked to provide his contact information and schedule a hearing through the Code Department.

5. Citizen Comments

MPT Isler reported that he spoke with a resident about Town Center parking issues, including freeing up parking in the rear of the Town Center by moving the emergency trailer, moving the dumpster, and/ or removing a tree. The possible installation of 2 electric charging stations lend urgency to these concerns.

Meg Miller Shane, 57th Avenue, brought a complaint about a code violation she received for renting rooms in her owner-occupied home. She has since submitted a rental license application to avoid being fined but plans to appeal the violation. She believes the definition of a rental property and family members in the Town's Rental Housing Ordinance is at variance with other law and generally accepted norms. She would ask the Council to rescind the license requirement for her home and to revise its Rental Ordinance.

CM Papanikolas replied the Town's Rental Ordinance is based on Prince George's County's housing code and is similar to that of many other Maryland municipalities. The Town Attorney has been asked to review Ms. Shane's complaint, and if the matter cannot be resolved the State's Attorney may be asked to look into it.

6. Town Council Schedule

The Council scheduled the Town Council candidate interviews for August 20, 5:00 p.m. and rescheduled its first worksession to Wednesday, September 5. A Council retreat was tentatively scheduled for Saturday, September 22.

On a motion by CM Sweep, seconded by CM Papanikolas, the meeting was adjourned at 10:10 p.m.

Town Meeting August 8, 2018

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Lynn White, Mayor Pro Tem (MPT) Stephen Isler, Councilmembers (CMs) Jason Papanikolas and Ethan Sweep. Also present were Interim Town Administrator (TA) Mike McLaughlin, Clerk Kerstin Harper, Treasurer Michelle Rodriguez, Chief Kenneth

Antolik, Public Works Director Kenneth Hall, Code Compliance Supervisor Freddie Glass and citizens.

Mayor White led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Minutes

Clerk Harper read a summary of the July 11 Town meeting minutes. On a motion by MPT Isler, seconded by CM Papanikolas, the minutes were approved 4 to 0.

Mayor's Report

Mayor White reported on the July 25 Four Cities Coalition meeting hosted by Berwyn Heights. Participants received a legislative update from County Councilwoman Glaros, a presentation on the 2020 Census and a request to support the re-instatement of career fire fighters at the Branchville Volunteer Fire Department. Mayor White also attended a celebration of the Berwyn Heights Volunteer Fire Department (BHVFD) Yvorra Leadership Development Foundation, which raises money for the professional development of fire fighters. A stretch of highway was dedicated to honor BHVFD fire fighter Yvorra, who lost his life there in the line of duty.

Mayor White continued that the Council held a special session on July 30 at which Maria Broadbent was selected as the new Town Manager. She asked Ms. Broadbent to introduce herself. Ms. Broadbent said she is honored to have been selected for the position. She had the chance to meet with senior staff and a group of citizens during the interview process and is looking forward to working for the Town.

Department Reports

Administration: MPT Isler said he has been busy learning about the Administration Department and has met with TA McLaughlin to discuss its functions, staffing and possible streamlining of operations. One of the things he plans focus on is the creation of a welcome packet for new residents. MPT Isler commended the BHPD, especially Cpl. Krouse, for putting together another great National Night Out and thanked Cynthia Jackson, the Director of the Berwyn Heights Community Center, for her help.

Administrator's Report: TA McLaughlin gave the monthly report for the Administration Department. He assisted Public Works Director Hall with drawing up a proposal on street resurfacing vendors to be voted on later tonight. He helped set up a briefing from Andrew Fellows, UMD Community Outreach Program Manager, on the University's connected communities initiative, in

which Berwyn Heights participates; and he coordinated the recruitment of the new Town Manager. In the coming month, he plans to work on the transition to new Town Manager; help create an information strategy for the Code Compliance Department; draft a proposal for expanding the Town's public information capacity and a proposal for improving the Town's return on investments.

Mayor White added that the Administration Department also hosted two visits from Pepco representatives, who provided much useful information on modernizing utility infrastructure and street lights. She will brief the Council on these programs at an upcoming worksession.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Rodriguez gave the treasurer's report for July. The report has a new format that is intended to provide more meaningful information about the financial state of the Town. Treasurer Rodriguez highlighted several important items, including an 81% compliance rate in business licenses paid; an \$8,000 savings on the purchase of the new Four Cities street sweeper and \$4,000 savings in the liability insurance payment.

TA McLaughlin added that the reformatted Treasurer's report consists of a detailed profit and loss statement and a summary of the detailed report. It also shows the percentages of revenues received and expenditures paid year to date. If the Council agrees, the statement of the general fund balance will no longer be provided as it is deemed less useful. There ensued discussion about some of the particulars of the statements.

Code Compliance: Code Compliance Supervisor Glass gave a summary of the code activities report for July. Currently, there are 265 rental units in Town of which 213 are active. There were 5 fewer rental properties compared to the previous month. The Department performed 13 inspections and 7 re-inspections and issued 13 rental licenses. The Department also issued 3 dumpster permits, 31 Clean Lot violations and 1 Commercial Clean Lot violation. CM Papanikolas added that he is working with Supervisor Glass on reformatting this report to make it easier to track the various activities.

Parks, Recreation, Education & Civic Affairs: Mayor White announced an August 12 rock concert at Sports Park and a possible rain garden workshop in September. The Department is expected to resume work on a Town organizations policy once the 5th Councilmember has come on board.

Public Works: Director Hall gave the monthly report. Public Works performed grass cutting and trimming of roadside vegetation, marked handicap parking spaces at the Town Center, and helped set up for National Night Out. He worked on a proposal for selecting vendors for the upcoming street resurfacing project. In the coming month, he will track the work of SaveATree's tree pruning activity and the County's storm water project. The crew will continue to update road signs and street markings as time permits. Director Hall concluded with a report on refuse collection totals and associated expenses and receipts.

MPT Isler thanked the Public Works staff for helping make sure that National Night Out was a success.

Public Safety: Chief Antolik thanked BHPD intern Marlene Anaya for singing the national anthem on National Night Out, then gave the police activities report for July. There were 7 Part I offenses, bringing the total this year to 29. The 5-year average is 25.4. The police also wrote 141 state and municipal citations, 39 speed camera tickets, and made 1 arrest for 1st degree burglary. BHPD is gearing up for its 'no bullying' campaign for the start of the new school year and will be hosting an appreciation lunch for the Seniors Club on August 21.

Mayor White said she received citizen comments about illegal activity at the hockey rink and possible MS-13 activity at the Nevada Street trail. Residents reported seeing Park police following up and are encouraged to continue reporting suspicious activity in the area. Chief Antolik said BHPD will take calls related to this matter and is coordinating with the Park Police. His officers are also on top of the hockey rink activities. Kids sometimes gather there to drink, and smoke and he wants to make sure this is handled in a tactful way.

Committee Reports

Quality of Life Commission: Chair Meg Miller Shane reported that all subcommittees of the Quality of Live Commission have held meetings and got a lot done. Outreach to the Latino community has been assigned to the Commission as whole and it is trying to recruit Spanish speaking residents to help with that effort. The Commission also agreed to take on the function of a Complete Count Committee to ensure better participation in the 2020 Census. The next full Commission meeting will be held on August 13. All residents, including Councilmembers, are invited to attend.

Education Advisory Committee: Mayor

White reported there was discussion at the recent Four Cities meeting about how the Cities' Education Advisory Committees can collaborate to improve local schools. It was agreed to hold a joint Education Town Hall that would address the range of issues concerning the schools students from the Four Cities attend.

Green Team: Facilitator Amanda Dewey gave the report. She said the Green Team continues to celebrate a year of recycling and will hold a recycling competition this fall. She encouraged dog owners to make use of the new dog waste stations Public Works recently installed and thanked the volunteers who participate in the Town cleanups, held on the 3rd Saturday of each month.

Ms. Dewey continued that the Green Team has looked into revitalizing the rain garden located at the southwest corner of the Town Center parking lot. The rain garden was installed by the County in 2004 but has not been kept up. The Green Team has contacted the Anacostia Watershed Society (AWS) for assistance with revitalizing the garden and hold planting event and rain garden workshop either in November or early next spring. The Green Team hopes the Town might help finance the purchase of plants and supplies for the project. Councilmembers expressed interest in supporting the project and plan to discuss it in more detail at a future workses-

Historical Committee: Clerk Harper reported that the Historical Committee next will meet in September and hold its election of officers. The Committee frequently partners with the Anacostia Trails Heritage Area (ATHA) and will send 2 volunteers to assist with what promises to be a great celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the first airmail flight out of the College Park airport.

Neighborhood Watch/ Emergency Preparedness: NW/EP Co-Chair Mike Attick said that approximately 70 people signed up for the CERT training on August 11-12 and is now sold out. It will include a disaster drill in which BHVFD members will participate. Mr. Attick thanked BHPD and Public Works for their efforts in organizing National Night Out, and all those who helped out at the grills. He thought it was the best National Night Out yet.

Recreation Council: President Susan Jones gave an overview of the Recreation Council's fall lineup of events: this Sunday at Sports Park a classic rock concert with the Woo Yeahs; September 20 an ice cream social at the Town Cen-

ter; Trunk or Treat on October 20 at the Community Center; November 2, a new event, Berwyn Heights team trivia; and December 8, the annual tree lighting.

Unfinished Business

There was none.

5. New Business

Variance 53-18, 5805 58th Avenue: TA McLaughlin said the home owner who applied for the variance was here earlier but has left. The variance is needed for widening a driveway at 5805 58th Avenue to accommodate 2 parked cars next to each other. This would require paving over a substantial area in the front vard. The variance request triggered 2 additional variances to validate existing, nonconforming setbacks of the dwelling and a shed. The background documentation contains a schematic showing the driveway extension and a photo with 2 cars parked next to each other on what is already a double wide driveway, with one half belonging to a neighbor. The County Board of Zoning Appeals will make the decision to grant or deny the variance. The Town Council's action is about whether to support the variance request by the home owner.

In discussion the following points were made:

- changes in the curb cut can be approved by the Town;
- a wider driveway would result in fewer cars parked in the street;
- there is no unique circumstance resulting in undue hardship to home owner if variance is denied

MPT Isler moved to take no position on variance. CM Sweep seconded. The motion passed 4 to 0.

Resolution 5-2018 - Award of Street Renovation Contract: TA McLaughlin said the Council discussed the proposal for street renovation contractors at the last worksession. It was recommended to award the contract for Phase I and Phase II of the Town's street renovation program to VMP Construction Company by 'piggybacking' onto a County contract. If approved, the contractor is ready to start construction this coming Monday. The contractor would complete Phase I of the street renovation program, leaving out streets WSSC is planning to work on, and then come back to the Council for approval of Phase II.

Mayor White expressed her concerns with the process of awarding the contract:

- failure to provide an updated list of streets to be repaired in Phase I and II:
- failure to provide sufficient options on contractors;

 failure to present comparison information on the contracts in a readily intelligible format, such as a spreadsheet;

MPT Isler responded, in the context of piggybacking onto the County contract, the type of comparison chart Mayor White requested is not needed. He trusts the judgment of Public Works Director Hall in recommending the best qualified contractors. He moved to approve Resolution 5-2018 to award the contract to VMP Construction. CM Papanikolas seconded. The motion passed 3 to 1, with Mayor White opposed.

Support for McDonald's Revised Site Plan: Mayor White said the Council received a presentation on a revised site plan for the reconstruction of the McDonald's restaurant at 6219 Greenbelt Road last Monday. The changes are largely confined to architectural style. The Council is requested to send a letter supporting the revised site plan to Planning Department. MPT Isler moved to send a letter of support. CM Sweep seconded. The motion passed 4 to 0.

Support for Restoring Career Firefighters to Branchville Volunteer Fire Department: Mayor White said at the last Four Cities meeting, the President of the Branchville Fire Department asked the Four Cities to support the rereinstatement of career firefighters to his station. The Council discussed the letter and made the following points:

- The letter to Prince George's County Fire Chief Barksdale represents only one side of the issue;
- The County has stated it would restore career firefighters if the Department moved further north on Rhode Island Avenue. College Park and Berwyn Heights Volunteer Fire Departments are close enough to cover the area serviced by Branchville.
- The Branchville Fire Department has new leadership interested in reopening the career staffing issue because it has difficulty recruiting enough volunteers.
- The Berwyn Heights Volunteer Fire Department supports career staff at Branchville.

MPT Isler moved and CM Sweep seconded to sign the letter of support. The motion passed 3-0-1, with CM Papanikolas abstaining.

7. Citizen Comments

Former Councilmember Jodie Kulpa-Eddy, Ruatan Street, thanked the Council for moving forward with the street project. The previous Council heard from

many residents who welcomed the planned street renovations. It would have been helpful if this Council could have had the price list from independent street contractors the previous Council was given. Those prices were substantially higher than what is offered in the County contracts. Ms. Kulpa-Eddy further commented that McDonald's has submitted site plans for the Council's review on two previous occasions. She hopes this plan will be realized and the new restaurant actually built. Lastly, she advised that variances are the only way for the Town to influence County zoning decisions and ensure some conformity with Town aesthetic and environmental preferences. Previous Councils have often attached conditions to their support of variances, mostly relating to storm water runoff and disposition of trees.

Phil Ventura, 57th Avenue, commented that National Night Out was very well done and attributed it to the leadership of Chief Antolik. BHPD attends to a wide variety of concerns other Police Department might decline to perform, ranging from checking on seniors to holding community events.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:22 p.m.

Worksession August 20, 2018

The meeting was called to order at 5:00 p.m. Present were Mayor Pro-Tem (MPT) Stephen Isler, Councilmembers (CMs), Jason Papanikolas and Ethan Sweep. Mayor Lynn White was absent

Executive Session (6:09 p.m. - 7:00 p.m.)

On a motion by CM Sweep, seconded by CM Papanikolas, the Council went into executive session to interview applicants for the vacant Council seat. Having interviewed the candidates, CM Sweep moved and CM Papanikolas seconded to select Amanda Dewey as the 5th Councilmember.

The Council also discussed the contract for the next Town Administrator. On a motion by CM Papanikolas, seconded by CM Sweep, the contract was approved without changes in a 3 to 0 vote. The executive session ended at 7:00 p.m. MPT Isler left the meeting due to a prior engagement.

Regular Session (starting at 7:02 p.m.)
Present were CM Papanikolas, presiding, and CM Sweep, as well as Treasurer Michelle Rodriguez, Clerk Kerstin Harper and citizens. There was no quorum.

1. Announcements

CM Papanikolas said that the Council held an executive session on Saturday, August 18 at 3:00 p.m. MPT Isler, CM Sweep, CM Papanikolas and Clerk Harper were present, while Mayor White sent an apology. The meeting was held to discuss Mayor White's refusal to sign the bond issue agreement the previous Council had authorized to finance road repairs. The Councilmembers present voted 3 to 0 to authorize MPT Isler to sign the bond documents.

CM Sweep said the Council has since been informed that the Town has been excluded from the bond issuance. He read a letter from Matthew Heckles, Assistant Secretary of the Division of Development Finance and Director of the Community Development Administration of the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD), who had helped Berwyn Heights with the bond issue.

"I am writing to follow-up on our recent communications regarding the Town participating in the Department's 2018 Local Government Infrastructure Program. CDA has carefully reviewed, and appreciates, the Town's efforts in trying to resolve the uncertainty surrounding the legal issue of signatory authority. However, based on the opinion of multiple legal counsel, including the Office of the Attorney General. CDA's outside Bond Counsel, and legal Counsel to the financial underwriters responsible for marketing and selling the bonds, a sufficient legal cloud remains concerning valid signature authority -- creating legal enforceability, disclosure and marketing problems thereby preventing the Town from participating in this transaction. CDA hopes that it will be able to partner with the Town in future infrastructure projects. Please feel free to contact me if you have any questions or comments."

CM Papanikolas continued, as a result of the executive session deliberations and Berwyn Heights' exclusion from the bond issue, he, CM Sweep and MPT Isler have drafted a letter calling on Mayor White to step down as Mayor. He read the letter into the record (attached).

In discussion, Meg Miller Shane, 57th Avenue, commented that she and other residents have tried to persuade Mayor White to sign the bond agreement. CM Sweep said the Town Administrator and Town Attorney are currently communicating with DHCD's Local Infrastructure Finance Division to try to get back into this bond issue. But the decision not to sign the bond documents hurts the Town's financial standing and reputation.

More to the point, the Town authorized \$2 million in road repairs for which it is now \$1 million short.

CM Papanikolas said the Town has sufficient funds to fund Phase I of the road repair program and will have to work out how to move forward from there.

2. Discussion Items

Independent verification of road resurfacing project and cost: The item was tabled because it was requested by Mayor White who was not present to discuss it.

Voting protocols for MML and PGCMA: CM Papanikolas said the Council was provided background documents describing the voting protocols followed by the previous Council, i.e. the Councilmember attending a Prince George's County Municipal Association (PGCMA) meeting vote in accordance with the position taken by the Council as whole. Since Mayor White requested this agenda item, discussion was tabled to a future meeting.

Damage to personal vehicle: CM Papanikolas explained this matter concerns damage to the personal vehicle of Code Supervisor Glass. It was shot with a pellet gun when he attended a worksession at the Council's request. TA McLaughlin recommends the Town pay for the repair, but since there is no quorum tonight a decision has to be postponed to the next meeting.

Raingarden revitalization: CM Sweep said at the last Town meeting Green Team chair Amanda Dewey reported that the Green Team is looking into revitalizing a raingarden located at the south-west corner of the Town Center parking lot. She has asked the County, which installed the raingarden, to provide assistance with project next spring. Further discussion of the item was tabled to the next meeting, at which Amanda Dewey will be present.

Minutes

The July 16 worksession minutes were tabled for lack of a quorum.

4. Department Reports

CM Sweep reported that the streets near his house have been repaved. The contractor has done a good job so far. At the entrance to the lower school parking lot they re-oriented a handicap access ramp. This was done upon request by the school's crossing guard and will make this location safer.

5. Citizen Comments

Meg Miller Shane reported that the Quality of Life Commission has met and agreed to take on the function of a Com-

plete Count Committee for the 2020 Census. Some Commission members already have experience with the Census. The Commission requests that copies of the 2020 Census package be provided to them. The next full Commission meeting will take place on September 10.

6. Town Council Schedule

The September 12 Town meeting will likely be rescheduled because it falls on the same day as back-to-school night, which is attended by at least 2 Councilmembers. The first worksession in September has been moved to Wednesday, September 5. The Ice Cream Social date is September 20 and Hello Huskies Night September 27.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:31 p.m.


